

A Message From Pastor Urbach

Vicarious!

1. Endured or done by one person substituting for another.
2. Acting in place of someone or something else.
3. Felt or experienced as if one were taking part in the experience or feelings of another.

Greetings in Christ Jesus the Risen Savior. It's mid-May and we are leaving the Easter Season. The term vicarious atonement might still stick in our Good Friday/Easter Sunday minds. Jesus was our substitute, He acted on our part to die under the curse of the Law. No more bulls, sheep, goats, birds, grain—no, Jesus acts on our behalf once and for all. He atones for our sin! Vicarious—what a neat word.

Vicarious—with Joshua Baumann graduating from Concordia Seminary in St. Louis May 18, I think of what is happening for him that I remember. So as he graduates and is Ordained as a Pastor of the Church and is installed as Faith's Assistant Pastor, I am a bit vicarious! I am reliving some great memories through him.

When I graduated it was fairly common to be ordained in your home congregation. Today it is common to be Ordained in the church that calls you.

I was ordained on June 6, 1971 at Bethany Lutheran in Omaha. It was a huge moment for Bethany. From fourth grade through all the

college and Seminary years this congregation had rooted me on and supported me with gifts. In the summers I would preach and when home on holidays I'd often help with services. Three years earlier Andrea and I had been married at Bethany. I remember the service, lots of fellow seminarians, Omaha pastors, a wonderful church reception and then a post-ordination bash at my parents home—well, what a day!

I also remember the dignity of the Seminary graduation. It took place in the Quadrangle surrounded on all four sides by the stately Gothic architecture of the Seminary under the shadow of the Luther Tower. My parents must have saved for weeks because we had a couple of extraordinary meals at a couple of St. Louis' fine restaurants.

So I rejoice for Joshua and Margaret because vicariously I am picturing in my mind a lot of what they are experiencing.

Ordination is a remarkable moment for a young man. Educationally you have four years of college, and four years of Seminary which includes your vicarage year (Vicarage—Vicarious—see the parallel). It is a long haul.

So I invite you now to set aside July 15 at 4:00 for one of the Church's very rich moments. We invite every family. It is important that our young families with children and

youth be there too, to witness this vital moment in the life of Christ's Holy Church on earth and in the life of Joshua and his family.

A final vicarious thought, I see lots of moms and dads who live their lives through their children and yes, even their grandchildren. This is good and it is normal. Yet, I'd remind all of our moms and dads to be sure you are also living your lives through each other so that when the kids graduate and the grandkids might be far away you still have your own joy and your own couple-ness.



Stewardship Gives God Honor and Glory

Stewardship gives God honor and glory as we, by God's Spirit, work-

ing through Word and Sacrament, become more like Jesus. In the words of Paul, "And we, who with unveiled faces all reflect the Lord's glory, are being transformed into His likeness with every-increasing glory, which comes from the Lord, Who is the Spirit" (2 Corinthians 3:18).

Stewardship gives God honor and glory because we acknowledge God as the source and giver of all good gifts. Therefore, our entire lives and resources are committed to doing His will and serving Him by serving others. Jesus honored God by doing his Father's will (John 17:4). We honor God the same way.

Stewardship gives God honor and glory when we do our deeds of stewardship out of joy and love rather than duty. God wants motivation for stewardship to be based on love and gratitude.



Lutheran Malaria Initiative



What is Malaria? Malaria is a life-threatening disease caused by parasites transmitted to people through the bites of malaria-carrying mosquitoes. When bitten by a malaria-carrying mosquito, people can develop severe flu-like symptoms, including high fevers and chills. If left untreated, malaria can be fatal. Pregnant women and young children are most at risk.

Who is at risk? Approximately half of the world's population is at risk for malaria. Most malaria cases and deaths occur in sub-Saharan Africa. According to the latest statistics provided by the World Health Organization, there are more than 200 million cases of malaria each year and of those infected, nearly a million die.

The Good News: Malaria is Preventable and Treatable Malaria-carrying mosquitoes generally bite at night while people are sleeping. Sleeping under insecticide-treated bed nets can reduce malaria transmissions by as much as 90%. With prompt diagnosis after the first symptoms appear, malaria can be treated successfully through a number of different medications. The key to preventing and treating ma-

laria is education and access to prevention tools, treatment facilities and medical supplies.

The Lutheran Malaria Initiative, made possible through support from the United Nations Foundation, is a partnership of Lutheran World Relief and The Lutheran Church-Missouri Synod to mobilize U.S. Lutherans in a global effort to eliminate malaria deaths in Africa by 2015.

Building on the success and strength of Lutheran networks already in place, the mission in Africa is straightforward: to teach people to recognize the symptoms of malaria, promote prevention, and provide treatment and prevention resources.

United Blood Services would like to thank you for offering the use of your Fellowship Hall during the Faith Lutheran Church blood drive on April 24, 2012. Your generosity allowed us to collect a total of 48 units of blood during the drive.

Every two seconds, someone needs blood. An automobile accident victim can use up to 50 units of blood; a bone marrow transplant can use up to 20 units of blood and 120 units of plasma; organ transplants use up to 40 units of blood, 30 units of

platelets, and 25 units of plasma. Your help has assured that blood and blood products are there when patients need them.

On behalf of the staff at United Blood Services, the patients, and their families, thank you for being part of this important community service. We look forward to your participation in the next blood drive on August 15, 2012!

Building News

The All Saints' Hallway On Sunday the 27th of May, Memorial Day weekend, we will dedicate the All Saints' Hallway in the Christian Family Life Center.

Here are the details.

As you know the five classrooms upstairs are named after St. Matthew, St. Mark, St. Luke, St. John, and St Paul. We even have a bit of humor with a storage room named St. Storage.

We have a proposal to carpet the Christian Family Life Center upstairs hallway for \$5,102.37. It will provide a quieter hallway and bring a nice finished look. We have received a gift of \$1200 from a Pierre businessman which we intend to apply to this expense. Therefore, the cost was only \$3,902.37. Dale Knapp has volunteered to install the carpet, which saves us \$855.00. Therefore, the cost is only \$3,047.37.

Since all the rooms are named after saints, the Board of Stewardship has proposed, and the Board of Trustees has concurred, that we seek 100 individuals/families that would be willing to give a \$31.00 gift

- in memory of someone who is a family member or friend or,
- in the spirit of Romans 1:7, the gift can be given in honor, in tribute, or in thanksgiving for a person.

The names will all be recorded in the red Memorial Books in the Narthex and a sign will indicate the Hallway is called "All Saints Hallway."

We will have the project done by Memorial Day week when we will have a prayer of thanks and dedication of our All Saints' Hallway.

The Sts. Matthew, Mark and Paul are completely done. Our intention

is to put the ceiling in Luke/John in 2013. For now, it is a great activity room for our youth.

The sign-up for the "100/31" gifts is on the Information Table in the Narthex.

We thank Bob Smith for providing the signs for the hallway.

We thank Jan Larson, Laurie Schultz, Renee Knapp, and Lennis Axdahl who chose the carpet for the hallway.

Thank you to all you saints of Faith Evangelical Lutheran Church for making this possible.

There will be a Dedication Prayer as part of our Worship that Sunday. Café Sola and doughnuts will be served following the 8:20 service as you take a tour and see how the second floor is looking.



Debt Retirement Here is a summary of two months.

On May 1, in addition to our regular payment we made three accelerated payments that saved us \$12,246.54.

We have now made 69 accelerated payments and saved \$304,330.25 in interest.

2013 HONG KONG MISSION TRIP



BREAD FOR THE JOURNEY

"I am the bread of life. He who comes to me will never go hungry, and he who believes in me will never be thirsty." John 6:35

A few weeks ago, Faith Choir sang the following refrain several times during a communion anthem:



One tube of toothpaste


One sturdy comb, remove packaging






