THIS SUMMER!! July 18th through the 25th. Pastor Baumann and Royce Loesch are teaming up to provide any male of Faith Lutheran, who is high school age or older, the unique opportunity to

A Message from Pastor Urbach

Greetings in the Risen Lord. I am always amazed at the beauty of God's creation and also amazed by how small the world is. It's dawning on me that this is probably my last Senior Pastor Newsletter letter to you. At 40 years and 11 Newsletter letters a year I have written you well over 400 times. Lots of thoughts are flying through my mind.

Thoughts of enormous thankfulness –

- Thankful to God that I have been called to be a pastor and especially to have been a pastor in South Dakota. While Nebraska will always be my home state, South Dakota is my home. "O give me a home where the buffalo roam" and I'll show you a messy house. While that is a cute song, buffalo really do roam here. Where else but in South Dakota do we "Dance with Wolves"?
- Thankful to you, what a marvelous joy to have served at Faith. I just don't see that many pastors get such an opportunity to serve such a uniquely gifted, loving people.

Thoughts of struggle – it has been a huge struggle to plow through this. The moist eyes, the hard swallow moments, the sad feelings of not leading Faith. The months have made it better and now I can talk about it without tears and then more and more moments of knowing it will be good. I will thrive in retirement and the parish will move on to yet another new plateau of good ministry.

I have enjoyed being a modest sized fish in a modest sized town. I have

gotten to know hundreds and hundreds of people throughout this fine state.

South Dakota is a small world.

I've traveled overseas and throughout the nation and I continue to meet people who know people. Yes, as the song goes, "it's a small world after all." It's a joy to go anywhere in our community and know people. Sometimes I kid people that there are enough people from our church at a business, event, etc., to have a service and take an offering.

My grandkids sometimes ask me if I know everyone in town. I say, "no" and two steps later I'm talking to more people and the kids smile.

What are you going to do Pastor?

Well, I can't fully answer that. Unless I was out of town, I've walked across Grand Avenue every day, for nearly 40 years. I know I will get back to Meals on Wheels, do more in our Kiwanis Club, play more pickleball, and see more of the grandkids. I have yet to see one of their church Christmas programs. I hope to travel a bit and perhaps there will be community projects to help with.

Jonathan and family are moving back to the Twin Cities,

I'm happy for them but I will miss that shorter trip to Bismarck that has brought them to Pierre more often and made for some fun quick trips to North Dakota. So Pierre is smack dab in the middle for Jonathan's and Jennifer's families. Pierre will always be

home for them.

On a personal note, I am also returning Andrea's vault to be buried in Pierre where I have purchased lots. She has a lot of family buried in the country church cemetery at Oakes, North Dakota. She spent the first 18 years of her life across from Immanuel Lutheran Church in rural Oakes, North Dakota. It seemed right at the time and we had discussed it. But Pierre is home and my children will be visiting. It will be a much shorter journey and one can honor more moments than just Memorial Day weekend. I have also cleaned her parents headstone and her brother Bill and his wife Gloria's stone. I have decided it should be a law of nature that birds should not sit on headstones. Building News

Debt Retirement! By the grace of God and the continued generosity of the people of God we were able as June 1st approached to:

Pay our regular June monthly payment of \$5,395.00 to the South Dakota District.

In addition, we were able to send two advance principal payments saving \$4,696.28 in interest.

What does this mean? (A great Lutheran question.)

o We have now saved \$457,072.88 in interest on our original loan of \$1,000,000.

- o Our principal loan balance is now reduced to \$678,521.62.
- o All of this has been done in just 4 years.

We have made 110 advance payments.

We will continue to take advantage of our lower interest of 4.125 and pay back our loan as quickly as possible.



I would like to express my gratitude for your donation and participation in the 2014 Feinsein Challenge.

With your donation we were able to submit \$44,504.30 for the 17th Annual Feinsein \$1 Million Dollar Giveaway Challenge to Fight Hunger.

We received—

- \$33,144.74 in cash and checks
- 11,162.56 pounds of donated food
- \$200.00 in pledges to be donated by December 2014

The money will help sustain our Food Pantry through the summer months and it also helped us finance the end of the 2013-2014 school year for the BackPack Program.

Our numbers for the use of the Food Pantry continue to be high. January through April 2014 we have issued 721 vouchers, which fed 1,946 people of 796 of those being children.

2. Approving a gift of \$500 to the Wittenberg project to be a Reformation 500 Club partner in the very exciting project in Wittenberg



Begeman’s most recent post was of a white clapboard church alongside the Big Sioux River. It was sunrise, and the valley was wrapped in fog. Many of the shots reveal spires and steeples rising high above the plains. Another image is the tiny Chapel of the Holy Spirit, built of quarried rock in 1922. It was shot at sunset in rural Corson County. Other photos have been taken beneath the gleam of Northern Lights, or against the night sky with the Milky Way as a graceful backdrop. The photographer often captures the little churches illuminated under the retreating clouds that fol-

low a thunderstorm. The beautiful and captivating scenes are endless. Regardless of the scenery or the architectural style illustrated in the photographs, the Prairie Sanctuaries always paint a picture of serenity and refuge.
