"Lead me in your truth and teach me, for you are the God of my salvation; for you I wait all the day long." (Psalm 25:5)

What does Advent mean to you? For some, Advent will come and go without so much as an afterthought. For others, Advent is the time when we dust off that Advent Wreath for church and in solemn progression light each candle as we approach Christmas Day. Speaking of Christmas Day, I am continually amazed at how eagerly the secular world anticipates the season of Christmas (it wasn't even the first full week in November and I was already hearing Christmas music on the radio and in the shopping centers).

So, what does Advent mean to you? Every year Christians complain about the commercialization of our Savior's birth. Much to the chagrin of businesses, we may even resist the urge to celebrate this joyous event...at least until the very end. For the most part, the secular world has no concept of Advent and at best a distorted view of Christmas. And perhaps that's the best argument we have for celebrating both; in order that we might be witnesses to the world of the true meaning of Advent and Christmas.

During Advent we remember to pay attention to the fact that as a follower of Christ we are waiting on Him to return for us. Therefore, we are *not to get distracted* by other matters which pale in importance. Waiting is essential to the spiritual life and how we wait says something about what we believe.

What does Advent mean to you? Did you know that the word patience comes from the Latin verb pati-

or which means "to suffer." As author Henri Nouwen puts it, "Waiting patiently is suffering through the present moment, tasting it to the full, and letting the seeds that are sown in the ground on which we stand grow into strong plants. Waiting patiently always means paying attention to what is happening right before the first rays of God's glorious coming."

What does Advent mean to you? As a disciple of Jesus Christ, Advent is a time of waiting and preparing for the Lord's birth and His coming again. Our waiting is different from most waiting because we wait in confidence knowing that God's promise will be fulfilled. While we wait, we are to be about the business of creating a community that stands ready to welcome Him when He returns!

May you learn how to wait this Advent season and then welcome the Christ-child as we celebrate Him who took on our flesh in order that we might be saved. Anything short of this will only serve to distract us.

From Our Associate Pastor

"God's Word for You"

The "Service of the Word" has reached its climax. After preparing your heart and ears to hear God's word, you have heard from the Scriptures. Each of the readings have looked at the day's theme according to God's view. Now, the congregation hears how God's word forms and reforms them. The first way that you do this is the "Hymn of the Day."

Each Sunday has a specific hymn appointed for it. This is a way in which the congregation joins in speaking (in this case singing) God's message for them. The hymns are based on Scripture, usually containing either direct quotations or references that allow for rhyme and rhythm changes. The Hymn of the Day places



God's message on your lips. You are singing, maybe without realizing it, what the pastor will speak in the sermon.

After the hymn concludes, the pastor rises to address the congregation. His message, the sermon, is the meeting point of two entities. First, the pastor considers the Scripture readings for that day. The sermon is usually based upon one of those readings (sometimes certain special parts of the service. such as anniversaries or recognitions, will cause a different choice of text). You have heard God's word speak about the topic. Now, the pastor applies your life to God's word.

The pastor stands at the intersection between God's word and you, his hearers. The sermon is God's word FOR YOU. The pastor takes into account your joys and struggles. His sermon highlights God's word in such a way that you are formed more fully into God's people. The pastor calls out situations where you might have strayed from God's design for living. He announces how Christ has accomplished what you could not. Then the

pastor guides you in continuing to live according to God's design.

Now the "Service of the Word" is finished. You have heard God speak from the Scriptures and the sermon applies you to God's word. Before the second half of worship, the "Service of the Sacrament," the church joins in offering prayer to God. These prayers reflect upon the day's theme and usually include some references to it. All of this hearing has prepared you to eat and drink God's word, his son Jesus Christ, In the next few months we will investigate how God comes to you in holy communion, the "Service of the Sacrament."

WAITING FOR THE LIGHT

"The people who walked in darkness have seen a great light; those who dwelt in the land of the shadow of death, upon them a light has shined." Isaiah 9:12

As I sit here writing this, and try to pull some thoughts together, I'm waiting for my husband to make a decision – whether I should take him to the emergency room or not. Throughout his struggle with cancer and age-related issues, I've found that waiting can be a daily occurrence, and patience is definitely a virtue. It brings to mind our Tuesday morning women's Bible Study, "Waiting." It is an excellent topic for our present culture, where everything is instant, and we are accustomed to getting everything we want NOW.

Throughout history, God called on His people to wait for His timing, and His will. Our study focuses on several biblical women who waited, hoped and wished. It wasn't always easy to remain calm and serene when their lives were put in a holding pattern. Through their stories, one can learn to draw closer to God, and surrender worry to Him.

> The night will soon be ending; the dawn cannot be far. Let songs of praise ascending now greet the Morning Star! All you whom darkness frightens, with guilt or grief or pain, God's radiant Star now brightens and bids you sing again.

Waiting and the season of Advent are synonymous. Already, as far back as in the Garden of Eden, God promised that One, born of a woman, would come to destroy the devil's work. Rather than focusing on the commercial aspect of the season, the four weeks of Advent should draw our attention to the coming of Christ. This contemplative time reminds us of our fallen, sinful condition – the reason we need a Savior.

The earth in sure rotation will soon bring morning bright, So run where God's salvation glows in a stable's light. As old as sin's perversion is mercy's vast design: God brings a new creation – this child its seal and sign.

The Advent season is a favorite of mine; it rather captures my heart. The themes of preparation and hope bring comfort to the murkiness of the world – the unending and senseless violence, disease, death and natural disasters – consequences of sin. Christ's light pierces the darkness. Winter is often associated with gloom. It is no accident that the darkest days of the year fall right before the birth of the Christ Child. A dark and hurting world is lit by a Savior who loves us and redeems us today and every day.

God dwells with us in darkness and makes the night as day; Yet we resist the brightness and turn from God away. But grace does not forsake us, however far we run. God claims us still as children through Mary's infant Son.

Regardless of how you decorate your Christmas tree, the one essential is that it has lights—the more, the better! As you drive around your city during this Christmas time, you see homes with various reminders of the season, and the common ingredient is lights—the more, the better! As stewards who celebrate the birth of the Christ Child, we understand that these lights are but dim symbols of the One True Light, the Light of the World, Who has come into our world and into our hearts. Jesus told us, *"I have come into the world as a light, so that no one who believes in Me may not remain in darkness"* (John 12:46).
