"This is the Word of the Lord"

In these articles we have explored the parts of the Divine Service. Last month we discussed the "Service of the Word," especially its first section. It begins with a Scripture reading from the Psalms, called the "Introit." This introduces the theme of the day. The Collect further explores this theme. In the discussion for this month, the theme of the day becomes clearer. The three readings, Old Testament, Epistle, and Gospel, focus upon that theme.

As the one covenant people of God, Christians remember God's deeds of old. He worked through the nation of Israel to accomplish mighty acts. Their history is your history, since you are grafted into God's tree (see Romans 11:11-24). God's work is a single continuous line of salvation history. It was foreshadowed in Israel and made clear in the work of Jesus Christ. The Old Testament reading shows this continuity. God makes promises in the Old Testament, completes them for the people then, and then utterly completes them in Christ.

The second reading is from a letter written by one of the apostles. The name for this group of letters is "Epistle." The Epistle reading varies between following the theme of the day and reading through an epistle (called "lectio continua" or "continuous reading"). The Epistles were written after Jesus had died, risen, and ascended. They look back on the events of Jesus' life and what it means for believers.

After the Epistle reading, the Church joins together in singing the "Alleluia." Also spelled "Hallelujah," the word is taken directly from the Hebrew language. Both spellings have the same meaning: "Praise the LORD." The Alleluia song focuses on this point: Christ alone has the words of eternal life, and he is worthy of praise with the Father and the Holy Spirit. Out of honor for Christ's work and words, the Church stands for the Alleluia and the Gospel reading.

The Gospel reading is the fulfillment of the theme of the day. Christ is the total completion of all of God's promises. These words and actions of Christ are precious to his Church. God has hinted at the theme in the Old Testament reading and Introit. He shows the impact of the theme on believer's lives in the Epistle. Now, the actual works of Christ are heard. The Church connects them all into a cohesive whole. Christ has made plain what was hidden or obscure before.

But the "Service of the Word" is not quite finished. The hymn of the day and sermon will drive this point home both in song and in the modern lives of the Church. After that, the Divine Service turns to the second segment, the "Service of the Sacrament." But I am getting ahead of myself. Next month we will explore how the "Service of the Word" concludes the



Rhythm: Movement, flow; characterized by regular recurrence of beat

In musical terms, rhythm is broadly defined as everything pertaining to the duration quality of musical sounds. Rhythm is metrical. Its time, have values are multiples or divisions of a temporal lowing: unit, the beat. In most compositions the beat is represented by the quarter note and the eighth note; also the half note on occasion. These beats are generally arranged in groups of two, three, four, six, etc., according to the meter established by the composer.

Rhythm is a regular pattern of long and short sounds. Certain styles of music, such as jazz, blues, marches and waltzes – even hiphop – have a very characteristic rhythm. Rhythm is the one indispensable element of all music. Rhythm can exist without melody, but melody cannot exist without rhythm.

We refer to the regular beating of our hearts as cardiac rhythm. The beats occur at regular intervals.

Rhythm also can be defined as an interval during which a recurring sequence of events occurs. We are all familiar with "the neverending cycle of the seasons." Spring, summer, fall and winter all form a cycle – according to the calendar, each one is a definite length of time.

Poetry is rhythmic. It is characterized by the arrangement of alternating stressed and unstressed words.

If you've ever stood on the shore by the ocean, you can hear the rhythmic rise and fall of the tide. It never slows down, speeds up, or stops.

Our lives follow a certain rhythm. Our Creator is the

timekeeper, the Great Conductor. Herb Brokering, a prolific songwriter and poet of our time, has summed it up beautifully in the following:

God of Rhythm

God of rhythm, God of sound, Music is your grace. Singing is your miracle; Prayer is your embrace.

Keep the meter of the waves
For our wondering eye.
Wake us when we sleep too long,
Stir us with surprise.

Raise our silence to your ear
Till it rise to sing.
Join each voice to nature sound,
Soaring wing on wing.

Talk to us in every tongue, Meter, cadence, rhyme; Set all seasons, eons, hours To eternal time.

Mark the beating of the waves, Keep the birds on wing. Raise us with the Easter dawn While your angels sing.

Listen to each tiny sound,
To each melody,
Let your mercy still abound,
Grace your symphony.

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STEWARDSHIP CORNER

Love One Another

God's nature is love. "For God so loved the world, that He gave His only Son, that whoever believes in Him should not perish but have eternal life" (John 3:16). Jesus tells us to love others as He has loved us (John 15:12). Love is the heart pf the Gospel. The Apostle Paul, who wrote much of the New Testament, wrote again and again about Christ's love foe us and our need to love Him by loving others. In his letter to the people of Corinth, Paul devotes a whole chapter to describe love (1 Corinthians 13).

When Sir Ernest Shackleton, an Irishborn British explorer of the Arctic, was asked to describe his most terrible moment in the Arctic, he said it occurred one night when he and the other members of his expedition were huddled together in a barren hut, trying to sleep. They had divided up the last of their food rations. There was nothing more to divide

Then in the cold darkness, Sir Ernest heard a quiet movement. He turned and saw one of the men reach over and pick up the provision bag of the man beside him. Shackleton said he lived through an eternity of suspense the next few moments. He would have trusted his life to this man. Was he now turning out to be a thief who would steal his comrade's last morsel of food? Then Shackleton saw the man open his provision bag, take out his last biscuit, and place it in the bag of his sleeping friend. Shackleton said, "I felt I had witnessed a secret moment between that man and God."

Because God has first loved us (1 John 4:19), each of us can be that person who gives away the last of our food. We can show love to one another in such a way, openly or in secret, that we

are raised above the level of mere mortals to become more like our Creator. That is truly the imitation of God. As Jesus loved without expectation of that love being reciprocated, so we can learn to love not caring if we receive love in return. We can demonstrate our love by what we say and do. As we love others, we become "little Christ's." As Paul tells us: "Love one another with brotherly affection" (Romans 12:10). May Christ's love in us overflow to others.

Becoming Successful God's Way

We may be willing to put an inordinate amount of time and effort into being successful because we value success too highly. Many have climbed the ladder of success only to find when they get to the top, that all they have is money, sorrow, and loneliness. Looking down the ladder, they see destroyed marriages, broken homes, and no happiness.

Webster's New World Dictionary defines success as: "A favorable result; the gaining of wealth, fame, etc.; a successful person." Scripture does not give a precise definition, but we know that it is God who grants success. "As long as he sought the Lord, God gave him success" (2 Chronicles 26:5 NIV). We can climb the ladder of success, but we ate to climb it God's way. As God's people our success in life begins when we acknowledge that God created us for His benefit, understand that He loves us beyond our comprehension, accept His love, abide with

Him in reverence and obedience, and faithfully serve Him and others.


C. S. Lewis wrote, "It is not your business to succeed, but to do right. When you have done so, the rest lies with God."

From the observation of this boy, we can begin to realize how little God asks of us as we consider all the gifts He showers on us every day.


