

Unto Us a Child is Born!



Often our circumstances have great influence on our day to day living. For example, a long period of overcast and dreary weather can influence how we feel. If our personal finances are tight (and whose aren't), we feel those pressures in life. If we are very well to do and major downturns in markets take 30% or 50 % of our net worth, people feel the impact. If we have a sudden turn of events in our personal health or a member of the family, it affects our lives.

It's in the middle of these circumstances that greeting of the season rings out: "Merry Christmas." Though we hear it less and less these days it, nevertheless, carries with it a message of peace, joy, love, and hope.

The words "Merry Christmas" are a greeting of good news for those who believe. But how can we enjoy good news when life seems so difficult? Can there be some semblance of good in a world where only despair and darkness reign?

"Merry Christmas" remind us that good news has indeed come into this world and took on human flesh when God sent Jesus. It reminds us that whatever our circumstance God loves us and wants what's best for us. Jesus came as a powerful light that breaks through the despair and darkness. Forgiveness for sinners and the promise of His care through every circumstance cannot bring to an end the life we have in Jesus. This is what Merry Christmas means for the one who trusts in Christ.

The apostle Paul knew this and had the confidence to proclaim:

<sup>18</sup>For I consider that the sufferings of this present time are not worth comparing with the glory that is to be revealed to us. <sup>19</sup>For the creation waits with eager longing for the revealing of the sons of God. <sup>20</sup>For the creation was subjected to futility, not willingly, but because of him who subjected it, in hope <sup>21</sup>that the creation itself will be set free from its bondage to corruption and obtain the freedom of the glory of the children of God. <sup>22</sup>For we know that the whole creation has been groaning together in the pains of childbirth until now. <sup>23</sup>And not only the creation, but we ourselves, who have the first fruits of the Spirit, groan inwardly as we wait eagerly for adoption as sons, the redemption of our bodies. <sup>24</sup>For in this hope we were saved. Now hope that is seen is not hope. For who hopes for what he sees? <sup>25</sup>But if we hope for what we do not see, we wait for it with patience.

<sup>26</sup>Likewise the Spirit helps us in our weakness. For we do not know what to pray for as we ought, but the Spirit himself intercedes for us with groanings too deep for words. ...<sup>28</sup>And we know that for those who love God all things work together for good, for those who are called according to his purpose. ...<sup>31</sup>What then shall we say to these things? If God is for us, who can be against us? <sup>32</sup>He who did not spare his own Son but gave him up for us all, how will he not also with him graciously give us all things? <sup>33</sup>Who shall bring any charge against God's elect? It is God who justifies. <sup>34</sup>Who is to condemn? Christ Jesus is the one who died—more than that, who was raised—who is at the right hand of God, who indeed is interceding for us. <sup>35</sup>Who shall separate us from the love of Christ? Shall tribulation, or distress, or persecution, or famine, or nakedness, or danger, or sword? ... <sup>38</sup>For I am sure that neither death nor life, nor angels nor rulers, nor things present nor things to come, nor powers, <sup>39</sup>nor height nor depth, nor anything else in all creation, will be able to separate us from the love of God in Christ Jesus our Lord. (Rom 8:18-26, 28, 31-35, 38-39)

Whatever your circumstance this Christmas season, I pray God's peace, joy, love, and hope be upon you and your loved ones. Merry Christmas!

## "Christ in Your Ears"

As we investigate the items in God's house, we want to describe their purpose. Last month, we looked at the altar. The altar is the focal point of our sanctuary at Faith (along with the cross). What we put on the altar is the most important part of our worship: the body and blood of Jesus. The altar gives us Jesus in a tangible form. We eat him and drink him. But the altar is not the only item that gives Jesus to us. The next item, or pair of items, also do that. The lectern and pulpit give us Jesus in an audible form; they put Christ in your ears.

The lectern is where we hear the readings. The pulpit is where we hear the sermon. Both of these items

flank the altar. As you look from the pews, the lectern is on your left, and

the pulpit on your right. The way they are positioned, you can look directly ahead and see Jesus. His body and blood are present on the altar. And you can also hear Jesus. The sound of his words comes at you from multiple angles. In the readings, you hear the mighty deeds of God. In the sermon, you hear how those words make you into the people of God.

The lectern and pulpit are fixed to the ground and do not move. But God's Word is not restricted to a single place. Sometimes, the Word of God is spoken in the midst of the people. This happens occasionally at Faith, and you may have seen it at other churches too. Instead of doing a reading from the lectern, the reader may come into the middle of the sanctuary. This is called a "Gospel Procession." The Gospel lesson is read from the sanctuary instead of at the lectern. But this is more than a different setting for God's Word. The Gospel Procession has meaning for you as God's people.

In Jesus, God's Word

comes down to earth. Most weeks, we hear about him from the front of the church. At other times, it is important that we proclaim Jesus in the midst of the people. The Gospel Procession brings Jesus into the congregation. When this happens at Faith, something is unique in the reading. Next time you see it, try to discern why this reading was read from the middle of the sanctuary, instead of from up in front.

The location of the reading does not change the message. It may highlight a part of it with special importance. Either way, you still receive Jesus through your ears. The lectern and pulpit are there to make sure that you hear Jesus. This is their chief purpose. They, along with the other items in the sanctuary, are meant to focus your attention on Jesus.

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#### **LWML Christmas Party**


All women of the congregation are invited to the LWML Christmas Party.

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## Light in the World


Regardless of how you decorate your Christmas tree, the one essential is that it has lights—the more, the better! 

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
