When: The dates for Circuit Bible Camp are: July 1-3 under the theme:



Sent Forth By God's Blessing



We are surrounded by expectations. If you want to keep your job, you are expected to do your work. If you want friends, you are expected to spend time with them otherwise you'll grow apart. In a marriage you are expected to love, forgive, and at times compromise. As a citizen you are expected to obey the law. There's no avoiding the expectations and demands placed upon us; it's simply a part of our world. And in many cases, you get out what you put in.

Yet, for the believer in Christ, it's somewhat different. St. Paul writes "It was for freedom that Christ set us free" (Gal. 5:1). The Bible clearly teaches that salvation is ours as an unmerited gift from God, bought and paid for with Christ's blood and given by the Holy Spirit. Our sins do not detract from it, nor do our good works add to it. In other words, we are forgiven totally for Jesus' sake. In grace, God does not punish sinners as they deserve. Instead, He freely gives full pardon and every joy of heaven. Yet, at the same time, we live in a world that awards hard work and punishes wrong-doing. How can we make sense of the two?

As sinners, our temptation is to "be subject again to a yoke of slavery", as Paul writes (Gal. 5:1). How many times do we desire to correct our sins before God by doing good things for other people, trying hard not to sin, or torturing ourselves emotionally and spiritually? But even this is of no use. We can't undo what has already been done. That is why we need God. You see, God has taken care of our problem of sin through His Son, Jesus. Through faith in what Christ has done on our behalf we are forgiven and we live each new day under His grace.

And that grace now moves us to reject the desire and temptations of sin and serve Christ by serving one another. St. Paul calls this the "fruit of the Spirit": "Iove... peace... patience... kindness... gentleness ... self-control" (Gal. 5:22-23). Rather than being our means to remove sins or earn heaven, we do these in response to God's love. We are able to live this way because God has made us His children. He has done what we were powerless to do, namely earn forgiveness. By the cross and empty tomb of Jesus, we are set free from the bonds of sin; forgiven and empowered to live lives of service.

"Now I Depart"

An elderly man shuffles through the door. He chooses a seat and falls into it more than sits. His eyes glance at the people gathered around him. He recognizes most of them. He waves to some of his close friends. A few of the people are new. He wonders if this might be the day. The man has been watching and waiting. He feels like his entire life has led up to this moment, whenever it may come. A family walks through the door: a father, mother, and baby boy. In that instance, he knows. He tenderly holds the child in his arm as he says, "Lord, now you are letting your servant go in peace, according to your word; for my eyes have seen your salvation that you have prepared in the presence of all peoples, a light for revelation to the Gentiles, and for glory to your people Israel."

The man's name is Simeon. His words are recorded in Luke 2:29-32. Simeon has been waiting for the Lord's Christ. God had promised him that he would not die before he saw the Christ. That day had finally come. God's promise to Simeon was fulfilled, and Simeon was ready to die, to "depart in peace." His words emphasize his contentment. It is enough to have seen Jesus; now he is ready to leave.

These words are also part of the communion liturgy. After the entire congregation has received communion, they rise together and sing these words. "Lord, now lettest Thou Thy servant depart in peace according to Thy word, for mine eyes have seen Thy salvation..." Your words, your song, are no less true than Simeon's. You are similar to him in that both you and he have seen the Christ. Simeon held him as a baby in his arms. You have held him upon your tongue.

The meager piece of bread that you have just eaten is Jesus Christ Himself. His form is more difficult to discern than holding a baby. But it is the same Jesus Christ. Your eyes have seen him, your lips have tasted him, he is united with you. Now, like Simeon, you can speak the same words. "Let your servant go in peace." Its meaning here is twofold. The Divine Service is almost complete. You will rise and leave the church building soon.

You go out to perform the tasks that God has given you. God's peace will watch over you as you live. And you also speak in an ultimate sense. Whenever the day of your death should be, you are ready to "depart in peace." Your eyes have seen the Christ, your faith clings tightly to him. Death is an enemy that has already been defeated by the risen and victorious Christ. His peace will watch over you even there until the day when he raises you from the dead.

The Divine Service has one more element remaining. God bids you to leave this place, but not before he grants you one last blessing. We will discover this final piece next time.

Belinda was born a Hunkpati Dakota. She is an educator, presenter, and visionary who promotes awareness and understanding of her culture in large and small circles.


She is the cofounder of the Dakota Hunkpati Kunci-unci (Grandmother) society whose mission is to empower youth, families and elders.

When Do You Say, "I Have Enough"?

It has been said that today's necessities are yesterday's luxuries. For example, not long ago, it seemed that only a few people has cell phones; now almost everyone has one. Cell phones have become necessities rather than just luxuries. We could list dozens of "gadgets" that many of us now feel we cannot get along without.

When we purchase things, do we think in terms of what is a necessity and what is a luxury? An equally important question is, "How much of what we own or want to buy is based on what our neighbors or friends have?" Jesus said, "So do not worry, saying, 'What shall we eat?' or 'What shall we deink?' or 'What shall we wear?' For the pagans run after all these things, and your heavenly Father knows that you need them. But seek first His kingdom and His righteousness, and all these things will be given to you as well" (Matthew 6:31-33). Jesus is telling us that we should first seek a relationship with Him, and He will provide for us because He knows what we need. God promises to "meet all your needs" (Philippians 4:19); however, there is no promise to provide for our wants or luxuries. As Jesus said, "Pagans run after all these things." In contrast, our attention and energy

as Christians need to be focused on Jesus.

Studies have shown that, as we move up the economic ladder of success, we may stop feeling grateful for our improved circumstances and focus on the luxuries we still don't have. Rather than bringing us fulfillment, financial success can actually increase our desire for more luxuries. Then our three-bedroom home no longer gives us the happiness we seek because we long for a four-bedroom home with a bathroom in each one.

It seems the desire for more things is like drinking salt water; the more salt water we drink the thirstier we become. When do we stop wanting more and say "enough is enough"? Because we are by nature selfish

and people,

that from can us greedy only the strength comes Jesus separate from

our desire for more and more. As Paul wrote, "I can do everything through Him Who gives me strength" (Philippians 4:13).
