By One Hour Saturday, November 2



"And no longer shall each one teach his neighbor and each his brother, saying, 'Know the LORD,' for they shall all know me, from the least of them to the greatest, declares the LORD. For I will forgive their iniquity, and I will remember their sin no more." (*Jeremiah 31:34*)

Have you ever heard of the condition called "Transient Global Amnesia" (or TGA)? Apparently, TGA is characterized by sudden memory loss and confusion. During a typical TGA episode, a person may become disoriented regarding time and place. While they'll are able to remember who they are and can recognize family members, no new memories during the TGA are made. This condition makes me ponder how empty life would feel if we could not remember!

The month of November allows us time to pause from business of life in order to remember and give thanks for all the blessings God has given us. If you've ever read the psalms, you would know that King David was in the habit of remembering God's blessings. In one such psalm he writes:

Praise the LORD, O my soul, and forget not all his benefitswho forgives all your sins and heals all your diseases, who redeems your life from the pit and crowns you with love and compassion, who satisfies your desires with good things so that your youth is renewed like the eagle's. (Psalm 103:2-5)

In this psalm, King David encourages his readers to "forget not" (i.e., remember) "all [God's] benefits." This makes me wonder, certainly our memory is a blessing. However, could forgetfulness also be a blessing? Think if mothers remembered the pains of childbirth. I suppose every family would have just one child. (This is especially disconcerting to me considering the fact that I'm the third child in my family!) Or how about this: how many of us, when suffering from chicken pox, fondly remember watching cartoons and eating ice cream but forget the itchiness, fever and all the homework we had to make-up for missing school? Indeed, it's a blessing to have a good memory, but it can also be a blessing to forget.

Thankfully, our God is a God who remembers and forgets...for our benefit. God remembers us and the promise He made to us. The Bible tells us, [God] remembers his covenant forever, the word he commanded, for a thousand generations. (1 Chronicles 16:15) Yet, our God is the God who also forgets, "For I will forgive their iniquity, and I will remember their sin no more." (Jeremiah 31:34)

Our memory is a blessing from God. But sometimes so is our forgetfulness. Considering what God remembers and forgets on account of His Son, Jesus Christ, we all have reason to give Him thanks...not only this month, but each and every day of our lives!

"The Altar"

In this next group of articles, we are going to take a look at God's house. Last month, we asked the question, "Will God indeed dwell on earth?" It might have been a strange question, and it has a shocking answer. Yes, God does choose to dwell on earth. He comes down into churches all around the world. He gladly enters these spaces when his people gather for worship.

Everything in God's house has a purpose. We will be looking at these items one by one. When you enter a sanctuary, and especially the one at Faith, its layout says something about the importance of these items. Using our sanctuary as a guide, we're going to start front and center: the altar. (Yes, the big cross might stand out, but we're saving that for another time). Our altar is the focal point of the sanctuary. What is it, and why is it there?

Solomon's temple also had an altar. This was the place where the priests would offer the sacrifices. It was essentially a big grill. The priests lit a fire underneath, and they laid the animal sacrifices on a grate. The pleasing aroma of grilled meat would ascend into the heavens, where God smelled it (don't get caught up in the metaphysical interaction of it...God actually calls it a pleasing aroma, like in Numbers 28:2).

Our altar has a similar purpose. We do not burn animal sacrifices. But we use the altar to celebrate another sacrifice: the Lord's Supper, Holy Communion. We have to be careful here. Communion is not our sacrifice to God; it is God's once-and-for-all sacrifice of his Son to us and for us. The relationship is reversed. On our altar, God presents the body and blood of his Son Jesus for us to see, smell, eat, and drink. It is a pleasing aroma for our benefit.

The altar delivers Jesus in his most tangible form. It deserves a prominent place in any sanctuary. Next month, we will discuss a pair of items: the pulpit and lectern. These items deliver Jesus in another form. They are important, and we will hear more about them next time.

Their depth of adoring, Lord, help us to share.

In the life of the Christian church, we remember those in the faith who have gone before us. The traditional day for celebrating All Saints Day is November 1, but many churches observe it on the first Sunday in November. God declares everyone who has been baptized and believes the promise of the Gospel to be justified, holy and blameless. Hence, the communion of saints includes both those still living on earth and those who have died in the faith and are now living in heaven.

Some march with events to turn them God's way; Some need to withdraw, the better to pray; Some carry the gospel through fire and through flood; Our world is their parish; their purpose is God.

When we think of those saints, we think of champions of the gospel. Some seemed super-human, super-powered and bigger than life. Yet, they struggled, and maybe doubted as well. I think of

David (one of my favorites), who endured long, difficult days, and Jacob who wrestled with God, his hip bruised and throbbing. Mary had to have sighed often, worried about her son. Paul suf-

fered in jail, survived beatings and was shipwrecked. Our children know them as Bible Heroes.

Rejoice in those saints, unpraised and unknown, Who bear someone's cross, or shoulder their own; They share our complaining, our comforts, our cares; What patience in caring, what courage, is theirs!

In my own family, my thoughts go immediately to both sets of grandparents, children of immigrants. Faith was a priority and their children were raised in the faith, whether it was a large parish in Cleveland, or a little white country church set in the farmland of west-central Minnesota. I was surrounded by those families in worship when I was growing up. They were my Sunday School teachers, they sang in the choir, participated in the life of the church, and most of them served into old age. Now the saints include my deceased husband, who grew up in the faith and served his parish nearly all his life.

Rejoice in God's saints, today and all days!

A world without saints forgets how to praise.

In loving, in living, they prove it is true:

Their way of self-giving, Lord, leads us to you.

The saints were both weary and triumphant, and experienced fear and frustration as well as victories. It wasn't all great deeds and miracles. It was sweat and tears, calluses and heartache. It was sleepless nights, dreary dog-tired days, uncertainty and bewilderment. Yet, they were determined, remembered God's promises and believed. It is good to remember what we share, and that they were just as human and you and me.


