It's no different here at Faith. Every fall, our congregation kicks off our yearly educational program with Rally Day. This year, Rally Day will be held on Sept. 8<sup>th</sup>. This will be a day of celebration as we'll have all kinds of festivities for our Sunday School youth and adults. Rally Day also marks the beginning of our various Adult Bible Studies on Sunday mornings and throughout the week. On Wednesdays, midweek classes will begin for all students grades 2 to 8 (and beyond).

# A "Good Word"

The Divine service is almost complete. God has come to you, his people, in both Word and Sacrament. The people of God have heard God's word and responded to him in prayer and song. God comes through this audible form, and then he also comes in a tangible, edible form. Christ comes down to earth, concealed in bread and wine. Now that God has served you, he has a final word to speak.

This last word has a few different names. It is more commonly referred to as the Benediction. It is a Latin term which means "good word." God will speak this "good word" before sending you out to live your Christian life. The particular Benediction in the Lutheran Church is also known as the Aaronic Benediction. It is taken directly from God's word, from Number 6:24-26.

In that passage, God is speaking to Moses. He is giving Moses many different commands. God lays out the duties of the priests. Aaron, who is Moses' brother, is the leader of the priests. One of those commands is what Aaron should say to the people. "The Lord bless you and keep you; the Lord make his face to shine upon you and be gracious to you; the Lord lift up his countenance upon you and give you peace." In the next verse, God states the reason for speaking these words: "So shall they [the priests] put my name on the people of Israel, and I [God] will bless them."

The Divine service ends in a similar way to how it began. It began with the name of Father, Son, and Spirit that you received in baptism. Now it ends by putting God's name upon you again. God attaches a promise to this Benediction: he will bless his people. The Benediction is not some good-sounding or merely traditional way of ending the Divine Service. These words accomplish something. Simply by speaking, the pastor gives you God's blessing. This is the perfect way to end the Service, with a promise that God will continue to bless you.

The Divine Service is completely focused on God delivering his gifts in a variety of forms. Call-and-response, singing, praying, hearing, eating, seeing. God uses many different senses and types of information to transmit his gifts. With a more thorough understanding of the Service, we can now begin to investigate where that service takes place. Our next year-or-so of articles will explore the various elements in the sanctuary, like candles, altar, pulpit, etc. Until then, God's blessings be upon you.

# DO YOU WANT TO BE HERE?

The sun-splashed days of summer vacation and trips to the river are on the downslide. Zesto runs will be less frequent, and soon the ball diamonds will be deserted. Summer activities are coming to an end and the fall harvest begins. While summer is full of action and fun, it can present some challenges. Communities might be recovering from storm damage, and crops may fail to yield. The church family can suffer as well. Members vacate, and so does the choir. People are on the move, or they decide to sleep late.... or go camping.... or load up the boat.... or take a vacation from church.... or something.

Regardless, the music continues – be it adjusted – as long as there is worship. Here at Faith, we make a concerted effort to keep our music program thriving and (maybe) growing throughout the summer. Small ensembles; vocal and instrumental soloists; invited guest musicians. But none of that works unless people want to be there.

Why do folks say "yes" to the call to serve? Why do they keep coming to choir? Why do the organists continue to show up on Sunday morning? It's not necessarily out of a dried-up sense of duty or guilt. It certainly isn't the paycheck. Part of it is pure dedication and commitment. Part of it is our enriching relationships with one another and the camaraderie with others. Part of it is that we long to drink God's healing and comforting Spirit in the river of community. Part of it is the joy of offering to God the gift of music in various styles. Part of it – believe it or not – is fun.

There is always a reason we show up – we are taking the Gospel into peoples' hearts and lives. We are helping others worship. In our present culture, especially, it is a tremendous responsibility. There will be tremendous rewards. There is always a need, always a hope. Our music program needs people. We need choristers; we need bell ringers; we need musicians. It's an easy way to give thanks for God's goodness; his abundant love and mercy; the beauty and blessings that he so graciously provides for us.

My dad always showed up. He is 93 years old. Unfortunately, the choir back home disbanded when he was 90 years old. Dad was a common laborer and was still working part-time in his 80's. He worked long grueling hours in all kinds of weather. He spent time with us kids and helped my mother. He was on the Board of Trustees and on the ushering crew for many years. He faithfully attended adult Bible class. He had no formal music training and didn't read music, but he had a good ear. No matter how exhausted he was, he went to weekly choir rehearsals; however, I don't recall that he ever came home from choir practice exhausted. It was important to him.



Come September, prayerfully consider taking some time show up; to connect and create; to reflect and refresh.

Thus all my toilsome way along I sing aloud His praises, That men may hear the grateful song My voice unwearied raises. Be joyful in the Lord, my heart! Both soul and body bear your part:

## "That My Glory May Sing Your Praise and

## Hymn Workshop

God calls us to sing the faith over 50 times in the Scriptures. It is something our baptized hearts yearn to do, and yet is increasingly a challenge for us. Our collected voice is subdued for many reasons: the effects of technology, the shrinkage in common song, the overall decline in music education, to name a few. One can lament some of these causes, but they aren't going away. Fortunately, challenges provide opportunities.

There are proven ways to surmount these problems, which Phillip Magness, a seasoned liturgical musician and educator, will be sharing with us. Come disconnect for a day and learn how to help a congregation find its voice, move beyond the worship wars, and nurture the Lord's song in your congregation.

### **Phillip Magness**

Phillip Magness serves as Director of Sanctuary Worship at Concordia Lutheran Church in Kirkwood, MO. He previously has served parishes in Texas, Illinois, and Oklahoma. Along the way, he has served as chairman of the Introduction Committee for the *Lutheran Service Book* (LSB), a member of the Board of Directors for the Northern Illinois District, and a member of the LCMS Board for International Mission. His sacred music compositions are available from Concordia Publishing House, Northwest Publishing House, JW Pepper, and Sheet Music Plus. Cantor Magness has several tunes in *LSB*, including UNION CITY ("If Christ Had Not Been Raised from Death," LSB 486) and the Old Testament Canticle from the Service of Prayer and Preaching.

Phillip is a frequent presenter at music and worship conferences and the chief musician for DOXOLOGY: The Lutheran Center for Spiritual Care and Counsel. He is skilled in French and makes regular trips to teach liturgy and hymnody in Francophone West Africa. His wife, Cheryl, is an editor and writer with LCMS Communications,
