

"Christ Before Your Eyes"

Last month, you heard about Jesus coming to your ears. The lectern and pulpit make sure that you hear the Word of God. These items in God's house are designed to deliver Jesus to you. But Jesus comes in more ways than just your ears. Your eyes also see him. In many ing Jesus. On certain festichurches, and especially at val days, we use this pro-Faith, a big focal point in the sanctuary is the cross.

Maybe a question that you have heard or asked yourself is, "Should Jesus be on the cross or not?" There are good opinions on both sides. Jesus on the cross, commonly called a crucifix, helps you to remember the suffering and death of your Lord. A bare cross helps you to remember that Jesus is not dead; he rose victoriously on Easter. One of these choices is not comes into your presence better than the other. This is not an "either-or" type question but a "both-and." As Christians, we remember and celebrate both of these days. Good Friday and Easter are inseparably linked.

If you look closely, we have both types of crosses. The big one, the one you probably notice first, is a bare cross. Christ is risen; death and suffering are no more for him. But our processional cross is a crucifix, that is, it shows a suffering and dycessional cross to begin and end the service. One of our students carries it from the back of the sanctuary to its place at the front. When we use a processional cross, we invite you to turn and face the cross as it enters or exits. Christians follow their Lord, and the processional cross is a great way to literally express this. You turn your body to face Jesus on the cross; your eyes follow him as he or as he leads you forth into the world.

The cross is a way for you to see Jesus and to remember what he has done for you. The sanctuary is filled with ways for you to experience Jesus:

the altar gives Jesus veiled in bread and wine, the pulpit puts Jesus into your ears, and the cross gives your eyes a reminder of what Jesus does for you. Next month, we will look at the way that Christ first comes to you: the baptismal font.



Missionary News from Ethiopia

Glory to God in the highest and on earth peace, good will toward men! (Luke 2:14)

This has been a special year in Ethiopia. The Prime Minister Abiy has won the Nobel Peace Prize for his work in surrounding countries as well as in Ethiopia. We are so thankful for his vision for this beautiful country and for forging ahead with his plan to promote peace and unity. These goals of peach and unity have also always been beautiful Christmas themes as Christ comes down to us in love, to redeem us and secure our everlasting inheritance with Him.

Many of the students we meet here at MYS are preparing to tell others of this good news and take the Gospel to the far reaches of Ethiopia and beyond. Those studying for higher degrees in the Master's program have great responsibilities in that they will train the next generation of evangelists, seminary professors and churches or synods that they shepherd. As this church now sits at 9.3 million members, has 9,036 congregations and more than 3,000 preaching stations and less than 8,000 pastors, she is the largest Lutheran church in the world and needs these leaders and the guidance that they will bring. We are blessed to train and give support to the leadership and impact the theological training with the truth that we in the LCMS have long enjoyed. Also, Lutheran Bible Translators (LBT) has helped start the groundbreaking for a new building for the Translation Track that started last year. Additionally, on October 31, the new Amharic hymnal was dedicated after five years of joint work between the LCMS and EECMY. Eric taught a two-day workshop to help introduce it to several hundred music leaders and pastors from around Ethiopia. All glory be to God!

Our family personally continues to do well here. Not that we don't have our struggles, but the Lord has provided for our happiness and contentment here too. We recently lost our Amharic teacher to a local international school and are looking for a new teacher. Eric's continued PhD studies have increased the workload, but are coming along.

Thank you in Jesus' Holy Name for keeping us here in Ethiopia. The students here are so eager for the truth, and it is plain to see how God is working through His Word to enlighten, strengthen, encourage and prepare them as leaders and as His bearers of the Light. May God be with you and your loved ones this Christmas and grant you joy and peace throughout the New Year!




High School and College Retreat
