"Show proper respect to everyone..." (1 Peter 2:17)

Parents demand it. God commands it. Aretha Franklin sang about it. And Rodney Dangerfield never had it. Of course, what I am talking about is a little R-E-S-P-E-C-T! Respect, it's a very interesting word when you think about it. American Poet and essayist Ralph Waldo Emerson once wrote, "Men are respectable only as they respect."

Unfortunately, these days there seems to be an incredible lack of respect. I suppose we shouldn't be too surprised by this, many in society have spent the last forty plus years dismantling the meaning of the word. It seems like almost every area of life suffers from a lack of respect. In fact, the word has become so absent today that you might be hard pressed to find anyone who even knows what this word means. That reminds me of a story I once read...

An archbishop at a church conference was looking thoughtfully at a coffee machine when a young theology student passed him. "Excuse me, young man," said the archbishop, "Would you have change for five dollars?"

"Well, well!" said the young man in a slightly disrespectful tone. "If it isn't the archbishop himself! How you doing today, Arch?" Then digging into his pocket, he said, "SURE, man, I think I've got some change here!"

The archbishop was indignant. "My son," he said, "I would caution you to show the proper respect to your elders in the faith. Now, let's do that over again: Would you have change for five dollars?"

The young man quickly took his hand out of his pocket. "Ah, your Holiness," he said, "I regret to say, your Holiness, I don't HAVE any." ~Anonymous

Although many today do not practice it; respect remains a powerful force and essential to make life livable.

Simply put, the word respect means "giving attention to." It also carries with it the idea of holding others in "high esteem" or deeming others as "distinguished and worthy."

Part of being a leader is respecting others. That is, treating them as important people, regardless of their race, background, economic situation, abilities or disabilities.

Take a few moments to think about it—

Who do you hold in high esteem?

To whom do you give your attention?

Who are the distinguished people in your life whom you consider worthy of honor?

Respect is a quality that lives on the inside of a person; it's not just how a person acts on the outside. Respect deals with one's motives, not just one's actions. Respect is something that can be given to all people...the young as well as the old.

Therefore, show proper respect to everyone today, after all God showed respect for all people by sending His Son, Jesus Christ to redeem all people of their sins. He held us and all people in "high esteem" by His willingness to suffer death, even death on a cross. If Christ had such an attitude about human life, shouldn't we His followers do the same?

"In the Water"

have been examining different parts of the sanctuary. The altar, the lectern and pulpit, and the cross all deliver Jesus in different ways. This month, we leave the chancel (the "stage-y" part up front) to look at the next item: the baptismal font. This is the smallest of the items we have seen, but its impact upon you is enormous.



I baptize you in the name of the Father and of the Son and of the Holy Spirit

Everything about the font is tiny, especially the font. The bowl can probably hold about a coffee cup's worth of liquid. The

water comes right out of the tap. A small group assembles in front of it to receive God's baptism. But all of this small-ness hides a monumental change in a person's life. Christ is claiming this person. Whoever is being baptized is getting adopted, chosen, claimed as Christ's own. They are freed from slavery to satan and brought into the kingdom of God.

This day occurs only once in a Christian's life. Yet the font is a continual memorial about that day. Every time you enter the sanctuary, whenever you see the font, you re-

Over these last few months, we member your baptism. Christ has made you a part of his family. The few small drops of water that touched your head covered and redeemed your entire body, your whole being.

> Christ continues to come to you through the font. The rite of baptism isn't repeated; once is enough for Christ's work. But the memory of that event, and its meaning for your life, must be recalled weekly, even daily. Your sins are washed away in seems small. Its size that small flood. You are cleansed and restored; you are made right when you look inside with God. This tiny piece of the sanctuary may be easily overlooked. But its impact for you as a baptized child of God cannot be understated. You remember who you are and whose you are.

> > This idea of memory will be important as we turn to the next few months. Other items in the sanctuary are placed in order to cause you to remember. You might recall something about who God is or something that he has done for you. You might remember the work that he has done in someone's life. These items are all designed to connect you to God and to his community on earth: the Church.

Take A Deep Breath

"The Lord God formed the man from the dust of the ground and breathed into his nostrils the breath of life, and the man became a living being." Genesis 2:7

Breathing is the most natural thing we do every day. We inhale to bring fresh, oxygenated air into our lungs to replace the carbon dioxide, which we then exhale. From the moment we take our first breath, we are alive. It is an amazing gift! One we take for granted, until for whatever reason, we struggle with lung disease and shortness of breath.

Breathe on me, Breath of God,

Fill me with life anew,

That I may love what Thou dost love,

And do what Thou wouldst do.

Singing well (and playing a wind instrument, too) requires good breath control. The breath is the foundation of singing. The lungs are the generator of the voice. Support for singing comes from correct use of the breathing mechanism – even if you don't sing in choir! Posture is very important. (Have you ever noticed that it is easier to sing when standing up rather than sitting down?) The body must be aligned, the ribcage suspended and chest up, while the jaw and neck muscles remain completely relaxed during inhalation. Deep, controlled breathing is needed to sustain long phrases, as well as support higher, articulated passages. (I think I've convinced most of the choir that if they relax and drop the jaw, stay open and don't tighten up, the higher pitches will come much easier.)

Breathe on me, Breath of God,

Until my heart is pure,

Until with Thee I will one will

To do and to endure.

Faith Choir members consciously have to make a great effort to breath properly when they are vocalizing – until it becomes a habit. I don't think a rehearsal goes by where they aren't reminded to, "Breathe!" A deep abdominal breath will produce a full, resonant tone, whereas a shallow chest breath will result in a thin, unnatural sound. The deep breath will make it much easier to sing through the phrase. The desired product is a rich, warm blending of voices with clear, open vowel sounds. Sound supported by air creates energy and brings the music to life.

Breathe on me, Breath of God,

Till I am wholly Thine,




