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The Lord is at hand; ⁶ do not be anxious about anything, but in everything by prayer and supplication with thanksgiving let your requests be made known to God. ⁷ And the peace of God, which surpasses all understanding, will guard your hearts and your minds in Christ Jesus. (Philippians 4:5b-7

How many times have you heard the above verse? Well, how many times have you heard verse 7 in particular? Practically every sermon ends with the words of that verse because the Lord wants you to have "peace."

Peace is not something we often hear about in our world (especially during a presidential election year). Political barbs thrown around. Protests and riots in the streets of our bigger cities. Doesn't sound like peace does it? It sounds more like the antonym of peace which is conflict. Yet, God is the God of peace. Which probably says a lot about how far our world has strayed from God.

The Bible says that Jesus is Himself, the very definition of peace (Isaiah 9:6; Luke 2:14). And not just any peace, but Jesus is literally the peace between God and His creation (i.e., us)! You see, when Adam and Eve fell into sin, because of their disobedience, conflict arose. But this

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conflict wasn't only between God and a disobedient creation. This conflict was also between creation itself.

But Jesus is what He has come to do; He is peace. Is it any wonder then that He suffered so much? You see, Jesus is God the Father's answer to a rebellious creation. That's why there is a bit of irony in who Jesus is and how He was received. The God/man of peace, Jesus Christ, became a source of conflict especially between His own people. The Bible outlines how Jesus endured much violence and hatred not of His own accord, but on that of the religious leaders of the day. Of

course, such rejection was not a surprise to our Lord. It was the consequence of sin. And the same can be said about our society today. The conflict (or lack of peace) in our world has more to do with sin than anything else. Yet, what our world doesn't realize, just like the religious leaders of Jesus day, is that God has provided the cure for sin in His Son. Only Jesus can bring real lasting peace to a world in conflict. And, as long as the world continues to reject God's peace, mark my words, there will be conflict.

As Christians, this makes our task that much more imperative and challenging. With so much conflict around us, we possess the cure. Yet, time and time again, the world rejects this cure. Alas, we are not called to be successful in the mission, only faithful (Revelation 2:10).

Christ has come to save us, and He remains near to us. Therefore, we can be at peace even during the worst conflicts this world can bring. For God's peace is not a

peace that comes from a lack of conflict; it is a confidence that Jesus will cue us no matter how difficult the situa-

Praise Him

And the peace of God, which surpasses all understanding, will guard your hearts and your minds in Christ Jesus, Amen!

In Service to Christ and Neighbor,

Psalm 150 paints a picture of how we worship God: "Praise him with trumpet sound; praise him with lute and harp! Praise him with tambourine and dance; praise him with string and pipe! Praise him with sounding cymbals; praise him with loud clashing cymbals!" All of these various instruments can be used to praise God. This month, we will take a look at the music of our worship service.

Music is, above all, a way to put God's Word in the mouths of his people. The ancient church sang (in some form) the many psalms. The inscription before Psalm 4 states it should be played with stringed instruments; Psalm 5 is for the flute. Psalm 6 is played to a melody called the "Sheminith," while Psalm 8 is played to a different one named the "Gittith." Sadly, the meaning of these melodies has been lost to time. But these inscriptions show us, even today, the wide variety present in the worshipping life of God's people throughout time.

Today our music takes the form of songs that we sing during worship. These songs serve two purposes. They repeat God's word, either telling what God has done or directing our response of thanksgiving to God. They also provide commentary on God's word. The songs express what it means that Christ became a person. They tell us why it was necessary for him to die. They delight us with the promise of unending life because of Jesus' resurrection.

God's people sing. To quote another Psalm, "Make a joyful noise to the LORD, all the earth!" This noise might be loud or quiet. This noise might be on pitch or slightly off. This noise could be bold or timid. But this noise of God's people, regardless of any other characteristic, ascends high above the earth to fill the throne room of heaven. God hears your praise; God enjoys your praise.

Music is inseparable from the worship of God. It is simply what God's people do as they gather to remember his mighty deeds and give thanks for his mercy and grace. It is what we do here at Faith. In different forms, in many words and phrases, we praise God through music.



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WAITING

It's easy to become discouraged. Have you been in a waiting room where time literally stood still?

Help then, O Lord, our unbelief; and may our faith abound To call on You when You are near, and seek where You are found.

Faith is often tested during long and painful seasons of life. Patient endurance can be a challenge as we wait for the Lord to work in difficult circumstances. Waiting is a trying task. As Christians, we know the Lord will act on our behalf. God is never in a hurry, but He's always on time. God is at work, even in His silence. When we are abiding in Christ, our inner heart is empowered and our courage is enlarged. When we rest in His love, our soul is strengthened by the Spirit of the Lord.

For you, O resurrected Lord, are found in means divine;

Beneath the water and the Word, beneath the bread and wine.

When we take God at His Word and trust Him without questioning – even in the most distressing situations – we will be enabled from within to wait on the Lord. He is in perfect control of our lives. His timing is everything.

He felt humbled and was visibly moved. It was clear that he was in the presence of a saint. He left pondering over and over the lesson on giving he had learned.
