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"Return to the LORD your God, for he is gracious and merciful, slow to anger, and abounding in steadfast love; and he relents over disaster. Who knows whether he will not turn and relent, and leave a blessing behind him, a grain offering and a drink offering for the LORD your God?" (Joel 2:13-14)

"Return to the Lord" is the theme for this year's Lenten series. The description Joel paints is a vivid picture of the coming judgment of God, the Day of the Lord. When you read them in context, this imagery is bold and terrifying, even for today's reader. It is then that we hear the call from God: "Return to the Lord your God, for He is gracious and merciful, slow to anger, and abounding in steadfast love; and He relents over disaster" (Joel 2:13). God's call to return is a call for all of us to repent and believe in His Son, Jesus Christ. And it is in this relationship with Jesus that we have God's promise of blessing (Joel 2:14).

The following is a summary of the themes from our series for the remaining midweek Lenten services. As you read through the summaries, notice how each one builds upon the next and reaches a climax with Easter as we "Return and See" Christ is, indeed, risen!

March 3: "Return from Betrayal". Judas appears in the in the Garden of Gethsemane and betrays Jesus into the "hands of lawless men" (Acts 2:23). This sermon explores the theme of betrayal, specifically the ways that we betray one another and Jesus through our denials and rejection of the faith.

March 10: "Return from False Witness". Judas' betrayal brings Jesus before Caiphas and the Council. In this sermon we examine what God actually means in the Eighth Commandment when He said that you should "not bear false witness against your neighbor?" (Exodus 20:16) and what to do when our failure here leads us away from God. Thankfully, God calls us to turn from our sin, to look to Him, and to find our rest and identity in Him.

March 17: "Return from Denial". Peter stands in the courtyard, watching his Lord and master being wrongfully accused, having promised that he was ready to follow Jesus both to prison and to death. But when asked directly, Peter denies Jesus. But Jesus will have the last word. He calls us to return to Him ... to return from denial.

March 24: "Return to the Kingdom of God". Pontius Pilate reigns at his Headquarters and is forced to wrestle with the question, "What is truth?" (John 18:38), but the real question is "*Who* is truth?" In this sermon, a King calls us to return to His rule and reign so that He can pour out blessings on us.

**April 1—Holy (Maundy) Thursday:** "Return to the Table". Jesus' invitation is such that He draws us into a place where we have fellowship with all believers. And yet, our fellowship is stained by sin. Our Lord's invitation to return is accompanied by His promise to make all things new, when once again we will share the fruit of the vine with Christ Himself.

**April 2—Good Friday:** "Return to Truth". In this sermon, we remember the sacrifice that Jesus Christ made for each of us. Our focus is on the One who is the way, and the truth, and the light, even as He hangs on the cross, wracked with pain and writhing in agony.

April 4—Easter Sunday: "Return and See". Christ is risen! He is risen, indeed! Alleluia! In this sermon we rejoice that our Lord's call to return was issued so that we might have life in abundance through the

one who lived, died, and rose again to secure our salvation.

I hope to see you (in-person or online) this Lenten season! The Lord be with you!

## "The King Comes"

We continue our travel through the stained glass windows of our beautiful sanctuary. This month's window is a depiction of Jesus' triumphant entry into Jerusalem, celebrated on Palm Sunday. I might be a little bit early for that day, but the attitude of Jesus aligns with our expectation during the season of Lent.

The window leaves no doubt about what is front and center in Jesus' mind: he is on a journey to the cross. Even amidst the joyous celebration of palms and hosannas, Jesus rides on in lowly pomp to die. The cross is squarely in his sights, just as it sits prominently in this window. Flanked by palm leaves and adorned with royal blue window panes, the King is coming to die.

Even as this window bridges Palm Sunday and Good Friday, it also touches upon the event of Maundy Thursday. The object at the base of the cross looks like unleavened bread, which we use in communion. The benefits of the cross are rooted in that bread. What I mean is that as you eat and drink, you are ingesting the forgiveness that Jesus won by his sacrificial death, and you are digesting the promise of your own resurrection in light of his rising from the dead on Easter morning. All of these events are closely intertwined, and our window helps to cement all these seemingly-disparate stories into a cohesive whole.

Jesus rides into Jerusalem, not perched upon a swift white stallion or accompanied by the blasts of war horns. Instead, our lowly King rides on a colt, the foal of a donkey. His celebration is the bold refrain of children, which grows so obnoxious to Jesus' opponents that they ask, "Can't someone do something about those children" (see Matthew 21:15-16). But Jesus revels in the praises of his youngest. Our King is right at home in the ordinariness of life. He enjoys the shouts that we rightly give him.

We will soon remember and celebrate the events of this window. Later this month, our King will ride into Jerusalem. He will institute a meal by which we remember his sacrifice and feast upon his beneficial body and blood. We will mourn the cross, as our King is executed like a common criminal. But then we will rejoice, and our songs of praise will continue until the glorious day when we awaken to his everlasting presence.

### LENT IS MY NEW FAVORITE SEASON

#### "And we who with unveiled faces all reflect the Lord's glory, are being transformed into his likeness with ever-increasing glory, which comes from the Lord who is the Spirit." II Corinthians 3:18

Do you have a special favorite time of year? Mine is autumn; always has been. Growing up in Minnesota, I loved the changing of the colors; the golden oaks and the blazing red of the maples. I liked the crushing of the leaves under my feet; grain dust in the air during the golden hour; the smell of burning leaves in the neighborhood (we could do that then); jumping into piles of leaves! Fall was small town football and an undefeated season my senior year (no Friday night lights back then). Fall meant Homecoming and Halloween; a new school year and sweater weather; pep fests and marching band.

During the seasons of the church year, I have always favored Advent. As a kid, I knew Christmas was coming, especially when preparations for the Sunday School Christmas Eve program started up. As an adult, Advent took on a slightly different meaning. It was still about preparations for Christmas, but also about preparing our hearts to receive the Christ Child. I love the music of the season and the church services. But over the years, life got so busy during the month of December. Between the shopping, concerts, rehearsals, writing Christmas cards, decorating and baking, it was difficult to find time to soak up the full meaning of Advent. When Christmas finally arrived, I was exhausted.

That's when I decided to look ahead to Lent and be really intentional. It is a season of reflection, repentance, pilgrimage and penitence. Ash Wednesday begins as Christians are marked with a cross of ashes, a sign of faith and humility. Lent is a good time to take a break from the secular world for a bit and lead a simpler life. Enter the wilderness, let the dust settle, meditate on God's word and details of his life, reflect on the cross, knowing there is an endpoint. Just as spring emerges from the darkness of the winter months, Christ appears victorious from death and the darkness of the grave.

Lent is finding one's self in a pit; a pit that you've dug for yourself through your own sin and stupidity, with no way to get out. But – look up and see that God, who didn't have to, nevertheless, had mercy – came and died so that you, there in your pit, could be rescued, set upright, and be freed to live on in eternity. Lent is for sinners and the perfect gift just for us, designed to draw us closer towards a perfect High Priest, who ripped open the curtain and veil that separates us from the Glory and Holiness of God.

On my heart imprint Your image, Blessed Jesus, King of grace, That life's riches, cares, and pleasures never may Your work erase; Let the clear inscription be: Jesus crucified for me, Is my life, my hope's foundation, and my glory and salvation.
