

A MESSAGE FROM PASTOR URBACH

The Summer That Was Not!

It has been a heavy-hearted time for communities like ours—Minot, Bismarck-Mandan, Dakota Dunes, the I-29 Iowa farm corridor and yet further south of Omaha. The word "Epic" has been used, those in the midst of all this would agree.



Our year theme beginning in September will focus around the logo you see here and by now it has become a familiar logo in our Lutheran Witness. The theme of, "Witness, Mercy, Life Together" is the heart of what our Synodical president, Pastor Matthew Harrison would like us to focus on as a Synod in the days ahead.

Among the numerous Bible studies we will have this fall is one I hope many, many of you will attend. It will actually feature, in part, President Harrison leading parts of the study and lead well by two of our Elders, David Zuercher and Bill Bossman. You will learn a wee bit of Greek, dig into the Bible and see how these three themes, the symbols, and yes even the colors can permeate our Synod and our congregational life together.

We receive our call list from our District President who makes every good effort to provide a list of pastors that match our ministry needs. Our Elders, to whom the process of the call is assigned, then ponder and pray over the names very thoroughly. They generally decide on a number with whom an on-site interview at Faith takes place. Then after more prayer and pondering they bring a recommendation to the Voters Assembly. Also as part of the process we have received the proper papers concerning having a DCE Intern. We had hoped to move more quickly in this but feel it is the proper order of events to get our Associate Pastor in house first.

In the meantime thanks to everyone who is making extra efforts—as Youth leaders, Educational leaders and teachers, Elders, and worship helpers. Our congregation keeps a single Pastor very busy. Yet your help, your encouragement, and your prayers—well I am most grateful.

"Witness, Mercy, Life Together" that's us, Faith Evangelical Lutheran Church. This fall will be a bigger part of that than ever before as we gather in worship, in study, in fellowship, all of that in the midst of the Mercy of our Lord Jesus Christ.

Operation Christmas Child



Priscilla Circle is again sponsoring a project this year called "Operation Christmas Child" or the "Shoebox Project".

We will be collecting items (that are listed below) and placing them in a "shoe box" (regular size shoe box or small plastic container about the size of a shoe box). Then these gifts will be shipped overseas for underprivileged children or children who were victims of earthquakes, etc.

If anyone would like to join us in this, you may drop your filled box (marked with age group and if for a girl or boy) or you may just purchase some items (there will be a drop box marked for this) and we will get them ready. Another way you could help would be monetary. This would help with the shipping or buying items to finish a shoe box. It costs us \$7.00 per box to ship. The children's age categories are 2-4, 5-9, 10-14- girl or boy. The labels for the boxes may be gotten at the church. The boxes should not be sealed, just a rubber band around them.

The Project will start September I and will run to October 3 I. We encourage all members to join us in this endeavor and put a smile on some children's faces.

GIFT IDEAS:

<u>SCHOOL SUPPLIES:</u> pens. pencils and sharpeners, crayons or

markers, stamps and ink pad sets, writing pads or paper, solar calculators, coloring and picture books, etc.

<u>TOYS:</u> small cars, balls, dolls, stuffed animals, kazoos, harmonicas, yo-yos, jump ropes, small Etch-A-Sketch, toys that light up or make noise (with extra batteries), Slinky, etc.

HYGIENE ITEMS: tooth brush, tooth paste, mild bar soap (in a plastic zip bag), comb, washcloth, etc.

OTHER: hard candy or lollipops (please double bag these) mints, gum, T-shirts, socks, ball caps, sunglasses, hair clips, toy jewelry, watches, flashlights (with extra batteries).

A PERSONAL NOTE:

In a separate envelope, you may enclose a note to the child and a photo of yourself or your family (If you include your name and address the child may write back).

DO NOT INCLUDE: Used or damaged items, war related items such as toy guns, knives, military figures, chocolate or food, out of date candy, liquids or lotions, medications or vitamins, breakable items such as water globes or glass containers, aerosol cans.

Thus far we have shared from our Love Fund \$12,200.00 with our families.

As this article is being written for the newsletter we have received today for our Love Fund a check from Faith Lutheran in Sioux Falls for \$395.00 to further assist our families. How very thoughtful and generous!

Building News

- Summer progress—The major project of the summer was to get the duct work into Sts.

 Luke/John/Paul rooms. Thank syou for the gifts into the Building account to accomplish this task.
- Fall project—Will be a small one. The Board of Trustees with some congregational help will finish the wall between Sts. Luke/John and St. Paul rooms.
- Debt Retirement—As of September 1, we will have made 3 more advanced payments saving another \$12.886.24.

To date we have made 41 advanced payments and saved \$187,299.48 in interest. This is remarkable—we certainly have no desire to pay the full \$1,097,145.95 in interest.

For those who think about the long-term well-being of our parish, it is remarkable to use our resources for ministry opportunities other than interest. Thanks for your continued gifts to the Debt Retirement account.

The Elevator

The Elevator Committee consisting of Chairman, Bob Shoup, Steve Ingram, Laurie Schultz, Jim Russell, Larry Coyle, Dale Knapp, Scott Collison, Jan Larson, Neil Schochenmeier, and Jay Fredrich are bringing the recommendation of an Otis Elevator to the Christian Family Life Center.

We currently have (8/15/11) \$18,019.00 in the Elevator account.

The Cost of the Otis Hole less Hydrolic Elevator is \$43,900.00. We will pay Sioux Falls Construction an additional \$8,300.00 to prepare the pit and do all the finish work to give us a final product.

Our strategy is (assuming that it would be approved at out August 28 Voters meeting):

We would affirm our decision with the Otis Elevator Company.

- They would prepare a shop drawing to which we would respond with our hopeful approval.
- It would then be nearly 12
 weeks before it is installed. This
 means, hopefully, it will be in
 before the first of the year. You
 might say it would be a nice
 Christmas gift to our CFLC.

Funding:

- We will encourage generous giving to this project
- Hopefully, we can raise nearly all the money needed up-front.
- If a small short-term loan is needed, we will do that with a local financial institution.
- If a loan is needed we would quickly pay it off with continued

Why now?

The City Building Code states that we need an elevator to use the second floor. We requested that if we proceeded to make plans for the elevator soon, if we could finish and use a part of the second floor. The City graciously has permitted us to finish off two classrooms. The other three are pending.

So, it is not only about meeting the code, but responding quickly to the good faith intent extended to us

As we completed the building in the spring of 2010, it was \$50,000.00 we just didn't have. While we don't have \$50,000 just tucked away, now we feel we are able at this time to take the project on.

Even without a big push we now have \$18,000 and we feel there is great interest in finishing this project.

Homes For Haiti

As many of our families work their way back into their homes, our Synod's World Relief and Human Care continue to build homes for Haiti.

Faith was very generous last year at Lent and we have some great news to share.

- Our gifts of \$12,213.87 have built two homes in the village of Beauchouin. This is one of three locations where homes are being built.
- The \$1500.00 sent by our LWML from Country Fair proceeds has assisted in the building of a Lutheran Church in the village of Beauchouin. Over 200 have been attending Wednesday evening and Sunday morning services. A Lutheran school is now being built next to the church.
- The floor plans have been modified. All homes now have a sink and toilet. While they all have roofs, the kitchens are outside on the porch area.
- Most villages have outdoor community shower areas.
- The Sunday School youth gifts were used to place a commercial water filter at an existing Lutheran school in Haiti. There are 62 Lutheran schools in Haiti.

So thank you! Hopefully, this Lent, we can take on yet another home or two.

Your gifts of love have made a remarkable difference for many families, from tattered tents to a home with a roof over their heads.

Urbach Family Memorial Garden

The Urbach Family Memorial Garden is a beautiful little garden which welcomes visitors on the Grand Avenue side of Faith Lutheran Church.

The garden was established in 2009 as a gift from the congregation to Pastor Brad Urbach during a celebration held in recognition of his 35 years of service to Faith Lutheran, and in honor of his 65th birthday.

It contains a short stone path which curves from the sidewalk to an inviting sitting area where you may sit and read a devotional, chat with a friend, or simply sit in contemplation.

The garden was designed and installed by Faith member Steve Bontje, of East Pierre Garden Center.

While it is named in honor of the Urbach family, the Memorial Garden provides an opportunity for all members of Faith to honor their loved ones. It has been designed to allow for the placement of engraved flat stones in a rocked area below the short retaining wall.

How to honor a loved one on a stone in the Urbach Family Memorial Garden

- <u>Placing a name on a stone</u>: To have a name included on one of the stones in the Memorial Garden, simply pick up a form at the church office, fill it out and return it to the office. There is a small fee, which covers the cost of the stone and the engraving, and also assists with ongoing maintenance of the stones and garden.
 - Cost: There are two options:

Name of deceased person - The cost is \$35 per name to have the name of a deceased loved one added to a stone in the garden.

Reserving space for a name to be added in the future - For people who would like to reserve space on a stone for another name to be added in the future, the cost is \$50 per name. This is a convenient way for family members to make sure their names are on the same stone.

- Filling out the form: It is vital to make sure you print legibly, and that you have spelled the name correctly, as the form will be the basis for the spelling of the name on the stone. Additional written information or memories provided will be maintained at the church with the form.
- Who may be included: As space in the garden is limited, people listed on the memorial stones must either have been a member of Faith Lutheran, or be a family member of a Faith Lutheran member.
- Names per stone: Each stone will contain 8 to 10 names, with one name per line. You may order as many or as few names as you choose.
- Engraving: A committee handles purchasing and engraving of the stones.
- <u>Acknowledgment</u>: Names engraved on stones in the Memorial Garden will be acknowledged on All Saints Sunday November 6.



Forms are available at the church office to have a name engraved on a stone.



Answers to questions:

1. When I request a name on a memorial stone, how long will it take for the stone to actually be placed in the Memorial Garden?

A: The amount of time it takes for a stone to be engraved after you make your request will vary, as each stone will contain 8 to 10 names, and all names will be engraved on a stone at one time.

2. Does the garden need additional plants, benches, or statuary?

A: Not at this time. An angel fountain which was placed in the garden in memory of Andrea Urbach - who collected angels - completed the garden.

3. Do I need to provide a rock if I would like a name listed in the Memorial Garden?

A: No, the Urbach Family Memorial Garden Committee will handle the purchasing and engraving of stones.

"YOU PREACH A SERMON!"

(Witness, Mercy, Life Together)



The name 'Jeanne Schweigert' is almost synonymous with music at Faith Lutheran. One doesn't have to attend worship very long before her presence is felt. On any given Sunday she may be leading worship from the organ bench; accompanying the choir, a vocalist or other ensemble; or she might be ringing handbells. As she

puts it, "It's really been my life."

Jeanne is a daughter of our congregation. Her family arrived in Pierre in 1941 when she was six years old. Pastor Streufert was tending Faith's flock on Pleasant Avenue at the time when Jeanne's mother enrolled her in Sunday School. Jeanne began accompanying the Sunday School on the piano, as well as playing for their Christmas programs on the old pump organ. In 1949 Pastor Rabe confirmed Jeanne and her two classmates. By the time she was 15, she began playing for worship services and joined her mother in the choir. In 1955 Jeanne married her high school sweetheart, Marvin Schweigert. Pastor Sohn officiated at the wedding, and also baptized their first two children, David and Lisa.

Jeanne recalls the church on Pleasant Avenue as being "a pretty little church – very traditional." Its small size meant that rehearsals and such had to be held elsewhere – often at the State Theater. The decision to leave the Pleasant Avenue church, buy property and build on Grand Avenue was not taken lightly. She remembers that there were some qualms about moving. By now, the congregation had purchased a Hammond organ, which eventually found its way to the balcony on Grand Avenue. Through it all, Jeanne and Marvin added to their family – Kristen, Carol, John and Jim – and Jeanne continued to play for worship services. There were times when, being the only organist, she had to play when ill.

Over the years, in addition to Sunday worship services, Jeanne has also played for many festival services – Christmas and Easter, ordinations and installations, anniversaries and dedications. "It's been enjoyable," she said. There was a time when she played for a lot of wedding ceremonies. That doesn't happen as frequently any more, but she finds herself more often playing for funeral services. She uses the opportunity to tailor her music to the family and to send a message of hope, comfort and encouragement. Jeanne makes an effort to select music that is uplifting, and strives to convey a heart-felt message. It's about sharing God's word through music. One time, following a worship service, someone remarked to her, "You preach a sermon with your music!"

Jeanne's musical abilities allow her to assist in worship, and she considers it a privilege to help make the worship experience meaningful. She is thankful to have been able to continue her music ministry throughout the years, even when experiencing serious health issues. Often times, when practicing alone at night, she feels humbled and closer to God.

The underlying theme in all of Jeanne's music is "All Praise to God."
