

"Many Gifts, Many Hands"



God has given each one of us the gifts of our bodies, talents, skills, and knowledge. While he gives these gifts to everyone, the type of gift differs for each person. No one else on earth is exactly like you. You are the only creation with your particular mix of talents, skills, and knowledge. God designed you, along with everyone else, intentionally, purposefully, and specifically. He created you the way that he wanted.

Our stained glass window shows hands engaged in five different activities. How you use your hands is not the important part. Each of these hands is exercising the same Christian love. God is not more pleased in any one of these sets of hands. He does not love people who use a certain skill or gift more than other people who have another gift. Our human nature wants to rank gifts, especially in the church. "I am not like that person who really seems to be doing a lot." That might be true, but it is not the point. You are not that person. God made sure of it. You are you.

God expects you to use your hands according to the gifts that he has given you. St. Paul says that in our opening verse. Whichever way God has blessed you, use it to his glory. It might mean swinging a hammer, feeding cattle, sewing dresses, drinking coffee with friends, or many, many more. I could not begin to list every way to show Christian love. The diversity of our expression of love is matched by the diversity of gifts that God has given to everyone. One of the joys of being a Christian is discovering how God has blessed you and then realizing how you can glorify him with that gift.

I encourage you to continue putting your hands to use at Faith. We have lots of different opportunities to serve our Lord. Just like the gifts that God gives, how you help will look different from how another person helps. Keep your eyes and ears open for the needs of God's people. A NEW DAY

"After this I looked and there before me was a great multitude that no one could count, from every nation, tribe, people and language, standing before the throne and in front of the Lord. They were wearing white robes and were holding palm branches in their hands. And they cried out in a loud voice: "Salvation belongs to our God, who sits on the throne, and to the Lamb." Revelation 7:9 & 10

Following a short battle with dementia and taking in little to no food, Mom left her earthly life of 95 years and went home to Jesus. After a hospitalization in April, and being moved from assisted living to long term care, she slowly deteriorated. I saw her early in January; read her Christmas cards aloud to her and played the piano for her and Dad. She was very weak, but was aware and we were able to have a short conversation.

In mid-February, while I was in Chamberlain accompanying Riggs students for Small Group Contest, I had a missed call from long term care, followed by a text from my brother. Mom was non-responsive; respirations were infrequent and the end was near. Early the next morning, I took off and made the seven-hour drive home to Minnesota. I entered Mom's room and she looked so peaceful. The hospice nurses had arranged her room in such an appealing way. Soft music was playing. A lovely quilt covered Mom and she was obviously comfortable. I talked to her but there was no response.

Later in the afternoon the hospice nurse arrived to provide comfort care. Her calm demeanor made me relax. Shortly after, my brother arrived, and then our pastor, who had been visiting with Dad, entered the room. He took Mom's hand, read Scripture to her, prayed, and finally blessed and marked her with the sign of the cross. I knew Mom was going to the place Jesus had prepared for her.

"Wake, awake, for night is flying," the watchmen on the heights are crying; "Awake, Jerusalem, at last!"

Midnight hears the welcome voices, and at the thrilling cry rejoices; "Come forth, ye virgins, night is past.!"

The Bridegroom comes; awake, your lamps with gladness take; Alleluia! And for His marriage feast prepare, for you must go to meet Him there."

I had to head back to South Dakota sooner than I planned because a winter storm was moving in. Mom was still with us, but I knew she was safe and that gave me comfort. I had been told to keep my phone close. A few days passed with no news. I was at choir rehearsal preparing for Ash Wednesday. At the end of rehearsal, I offered a devotion from a book, "The One Year Book of Hymns." The hymn for February 22nd was "Wake, Awake, For Night Is Flying." I read the three verses of the hymn to the choir, followed by the short devotion. I have always associated that hymn with Advent, but didn't really give it a thought that I was reading it in February. Rehearsal ended and I went home for the evening. I was sound asleep when my cell phone woke me: Midnight. 12:00 am. Mom had left us a few minutes before. I visited briefly with the nurse, hung up, and all I could think of was "Midnight hears the welcome voices." Mom was at the marriage feast in the presence of the Bridegroom.

Later that morning, I looked up the hymn in the Lutheran Service Book — LSB516. It is not in the Advent section, but in End Times. It was penned by Philipp Nicolai, a pastor in Unna, Germany, at the time a terrible plague hit the town (1597-1598). He often watched and participated in the burial of friends and parishioners each day. During that difficult time, he wrote this hymn. He looked forward to a day when disease and death would be past, when rejoicing and feasting would carry the day. Christ had given him an eternal perspective on this present life.

We will soon be celebrating Easter, the day when Jesus rose from the grave. Death could not hold Him. He gave His life to redeem us, to buy us back from our slavery to sin. Death has been swallowed up in victory! Because of His resurrection, we have the promise of eternal life — salvation! We, too, will enter the marriage feast.

Greetings!

In March we hosted our Butter Braid Fundraiser. Thank you to everyone who supported us through this fundraiser! We made over a \$2500 profit. This will take care of most of - if not all of - the cost of the handwashing sinks we need. We are hoping we will have these by the end of April! We also switched our entire waiting list over to a new system. This was quite a bit of work as you can imagine; we had over 106 families on our waiting list and had to contact the majority of them for missing information. However, it was totally worth it! This system sorts the children according to age, the time they were put on the waiting list, and what priority they are set at (current staff and families are priority 1 and 2 so they sit at the top of the list). It also allows parents to sign themselves up or remove themselves from the list as well as create a "Parent Portal" so that they can keep up to date on where they are on the list. This will make it so much easier for those in the community looking for care to get on a waiting list right away, as well as for me in keeping track of everyone and

keeping it up to date! It's a huge improvement from the simple Excel spreadsheet we have used in the past.

a potluck luncheon. Bring a dish to share. Hope to see you there!




Mexico Mission Trip Spring Yard Work – Rent-A-Worker
