

Being a More Complete Person



Christ and the power of his resurrection....

Philippians 3:10



"I'd like to get saved. There's just one problem— I'm terrified of getting baptized."

"Lift High the Cross"

"And I, when I am lifted up from the earth, will draw all people to myself" (John 12:32). Our Lord speaks these words during Holy Week, just a few days before he will die. In the two thousand years since that event, the meaning and importance of the cross has become clear to Christians. But for the first hearers of our Lord's words, they likely took great offense to what he said about "being lifted up."

The cross is a symbol of execution. It was a torturous death reserved for the worst possible types of criminals. The Romans practiced crucifying prisoners for some time before our Lord was born. Bad people were crucified. Men of infamous wickedness would be sentenced to death by crucifixion. But the one person who shouldn't be crucified is the Messiah.

The fact that Jesus died by crucifixion created a major stumbling block. We have lost the cultural association of crucifixion, so we can more easily see the benefits that come to us in our Lord's death. But for the first Christians, the method of our Lord's dying was a problem. St. Paul helps us to understand the issue: "For the word of the cross is folly to those who are perishing, but to us who are being saved it is the power of God" (1 Cor 1:18)

You and I, as ones saved by Jesus' death, can love the cross. We wear this symbol as jewelry in various ways. We don't love it as a device of execution. Instead, we see that on the cross God has worked our salvation. What appears as a symbol of wickedness and evil (in that only "bad people" were crucified) is to us the means of our salvation. We can remember and even celebrate the cross as the way that God has forgiven our sins and made us members of his eternal kingdom.

We take comfort knowing that Jesus died on the cross so that we can live. But this knowledge is not meant to be kept to ourselves. Instead, we share with friends, family, and neighbors the hope that we have in Jesus. We tell them how the suffering of Jesus has created peace between us and God. We speak in the hopes that they too would see the cross as a beautiful symbol and as a life-giving event.

"Lift high the cross, the love of Christ proclaim, till all the world adore His sacred name" This refrain from the hymn "Lift High the Cross" reminds us of the importance of the cross. We thank God that his Son was lifted up for our sake. Join us next time as we continue to investigate the windows in our beautiful sanctuary.

Endowment Fund

It has been requested that we give an explanation of the Endowment Fund and the options within that fund.

This is truly about leaving a legacy. A donation to any part of the endowment would insure that you could support the ministry of this church well after you have passed on or left the church. The different accounts within the endowment were created to help a giver to have the opportunity to be specific about the areas where their investment is directed. Additionally, the giver is not limited to these specific accounts. Other fund accounts may be added (example: Scholarships for the daycare or preschool). The Board of Endowment wants this to be flexible and accommodating to the givers desires for their donation.

Blessings in Faith is the original Fund and is where any undesignated gifts to the Endowment fund go. The earnings are disbursed as follows: the first 15% to Missions (District/Synod), the second 15% to Seminary student aid, the rest goes to numerous projects within the congregation as requests are received and the Board designate.

Generations in Faith gifts go into the Endowment General Fund. The earnings here are used for general operations of the church. Just as if you were designating your offering for the general fund.



Foundations in Faith gifts go toward the Endowment Building Fund. Earnings from this fund go for building and maintenance projects.


Future in Faith gifts go toward Education. Earnings here are used for the support of Christian education within the church.



January has arrived, and winter is fully upon us. It's not as warm outside, and there's not as much life in nature. If you live where winter is cold, you might be growing tired of boots, hats, mittens and puffy, shapeless coats. There's more maintenance to your vehicle – warming it up, scraping your windshield – and driving can be a challenge. The heating bill for your dwelling may soar. Many people experience a letdown after Christmas. Looking outside, there may not be much to feel particularly joyful about.

Growing up in the farming and lake country of Minnesota (also referred to as Minne-SNOW-ta), cold and ice and snow were common in January and beyond. As a kid, there was a lot to look forward to in the winter. For one thing, my birthday was in January and I was preoccupied with a party and presents. Also, the ice rink was open, and that's where we headed to after school and on weekends. Many evenings were spent skating under the stars and the string of lights over the rink; the loudspeaker blasting the latest tunes. Kids crowded around the wood-burning stove in the warming house, thawing out their fingers and toes. The odor of wet mittens permeated the air.

As a teen and beyond, January offered a lot. There were upcoming basketball games and wrestling meets that bred longtime rivalries between all the small towns in the area. The junior class always sponsored a waffle feed to fund the prom. The fire department from the tiny burg of Leaf Valley held a potato pancake supper that drew people from miles around. We still met at the ice rink and went snowmobiling and took part in all kinds of activities at school. Youth group meetings at church meant hot chocolate and sloppy joes. Life was good.

I think about those past years from time to time. Sometimes winter saps my energy. I'm tired at the end of day. Some days I don't care for the cold and the darkness, or the inconvenience that six inches of snow brings. However, I have learned to appreciate the beauty of January and the winter season. Winter's beauty is more subtle. There is less color, but a full moon is crystal clear. Icicles glisten in the sunshine, and a winter sunset spreads shadows and pastel hues on the snowy hills. Winter is for resting. Even nature takes a break and animals hibernate. I think about my folks in long term care and wonder what they are thinking about in January. Dad loved ice fishing and shoveled a lot of snow in his day. Both parents used to recall epic blizzards from their past. They are in the "winter" of their lives and looking forward to being with Jesus. January is a month of new beginnings, the first month of a new year. You may groan when you think of January or dread the season of winter, but remember that God makes each day. He also made it with you in it. Remind yourself that each day is purposed by the Lord.

Fed by Faith, formerly referred to as the Love Kitchen, will be actively starting in January 2022 to prepare meals for congregants and family members in need. These meals will consist of a frozen entrée that can easily be reheated in the oven or the stovetop, or microwave if thawed; frozen vegetables; canned, jarred or fresh fruit; buns/breads; and bars/cookies. These are meant to be used at times when someone has an illness or recovering at home, a new baby or a death in the family, or just a general need. Normally we will meet the first Thursday every month as needed. However, our cooking date in January will be held on the second Thursday, January 13, due a scheduling conflict.

The ministry is based on Matthew 25:35-36 and will be used to share God's love through nourishment of body and faith. The congregation can be helpful by notifying Nancy Shoup at 280-2091 or call the church office regarding those who can be served by the ministry. This ministry will only be successful if we are aware of those in need and are provided with those names.

Members may also bake at home and divide cookies or bars in portions of a dozen and place in a freezer bag. These can be brought to the church office and placed in the dedicated freezer in the kitchen. It is requested you not use nuts or peanut butter in your baked goods, but if you do, they must be properly labeled to indicate that fact. If you desire monetary assistance regarding the preparation of those bars/cookies please let Nancy know and that can be arranged.

We pray God's blessing on this ministry as we move forward to serve our Lord through Word and action. Thank you!
