



#### "The Lasts..."

The end of the school year brings some natural lasts. Last day of school is an obvious one. But there are also plenty of other "lasts:" last concert, last lunch, last time I see this friend. The end of a school year introduces young people to a pattern, one that will continue throughout the remainder of their lives: lasts bring firsts. The last day of school is followed by the first day of summer. The last time I see a certain friend might be followed by the first time I meet a new friend.

We often have a hard time seeing the "firsts." It may be difficult because firsts and lasts do not always line up neatly. The last day of an old job and the first day of a new job follow in a logical order. But our relationships with other people rarely fit into such perfect categories. When one person leaves our lives, we may have already met someone new. That new person might have been in our lives for a while, but their presence might not mean as much until the moment of change and transition.

I want to encourage you if you are experiencing a time of transition. While we often cannot see the twists and turns of our journey, God is a much more adept navigator. You can have confidence in his skills, even when the journey takes an unexpected departure. It was only unexpected for one of you. Your faithful God will continue to guide you through every season of life.

Trusting in him, keep your eyes open for those "firsts." This might be the first chance to try something that you never thought you would do. It could be the first time attending something that now fits your current stage of life. Maybe you will join with other people for the first time and understand what they have been saying or doing.

I have one more first that I want you to remember. It is a little bit like the first day of summer or the first time trying a new hobby: the first day in paradise. Because of Jesus, all of us are heading for this wonderful first. Some people have already been privileged to receive it. All of us will inherit paradise with Jesus as our individual journeys progress. When we arrive at that first, we will give up "lasts." We will not have a last day in paradise. We will not have to say goodbye to someone for the last time. In fact, "lasts" will, at last, be gone.

#### Faith Lutheran donates over a ton of items to the Food Pantry!



Faith Lutheran's congregation once again demonstrated their love for God's flock by collecting more than a ton of food and household products for the Pierre-Ft. Pierre Food Pantry in March!

The congregation donated 2,206 items that filled over 160 boxes and weighed a total of 2,105.8 pounds. In addition, members of the congregation gave financial contributions totaling \$1,750. The donations were sorted, counted, boxed and labeled before being delivered to the Food Pantry on April 6th. The delivery came on the heels of a blizzard, and our crew helped shovel a path to the door before unloading the items!

#### Among items collected this year:

344 cans and packages of soup, stew, chili and ramen noodles

217 packages/containers of soap, shampoo, toothpaste, toothbrushes, personal care products

191 cans of fruits and vegetables

185 boxes of macaroni and cheese

155 cans of tuna, chicken and other canned meat

110 boxes and bags of dry pasta

96 boxes and bags of cereal

75 boxes of "helper" meals for hamburger, tuna and chicken

53 bottles and packages of household products: cleaners, dish soap, trash bags, paper towels, toilet paper 49 bags of flour and sugar

46 bottles of peanut butter and jelly

44 cans of spaghetti sauce

41 bags/boxes of rice mixes

40 boxes of cake/brownie mixes

33 boxes of pancake mix

**30** boxes of potato mixes

20 bottles of syrup

On May 27, 2023, a team of nine from Faith Lutheran Church, will travel to El Paso, Texas, to work on servant projects and share the Gospel just across the border in Juárez, Mexico. The trip is coordinated with Ysleta Lutheran Mission Human Care (ylm.org), an LCMS Recognized Service Organization that provides relief and human care services while planting and nurturing missions in the El Paso/Juárez region of the U.S./Mexico border. Founded in 1982, YLM benefits the lives of thousands of people every year.

In its sixth year of traveling to El Paso for missions, the team has ranged from nine to 35 individuals. This year, the team of nine will include five adults and four high school and college students. It is exciting to watch a group of individuals start out timid in handing out Bibles and praying with others, but then at the end of the trip be secure and intentional to follow the Great Commis-

sion as recorded in Matt. 28:19-20 and to see people through God's eyes.

To prepare for the trip, the team meets weekly and also engages in a study on the Great Commission. To raise funds, the group holds soup meals before Lenten worship, and does lawn work in the spring and other various projects through their "Rent-A-Worker" service. This is a wonderful way for the team to work together, serve congregation members and others, and pray for and witness to those who asked for services.

The team builds a house for a family selected by YLM. In the past, a house has been built for a family living in a van, for a young man confined to a wheelchair, and for an elderly woman who could not afford a home. The families often help with the building project and the team becomes very attached to the family. The team visits the families when they return each year, as time permits. Although the homes are humble compared to American standards, each family cherishes their new home and is so thankful. The Faith mission team spends much time handing out Bibles and Gospel tracts at busy shopping centers in El Paso and Juárez. Many pillowcase dresses are made by loving hands from Faith and taken along to give out to young girls. In addition, the group helps YLM with food distribution on a Saturday morning before returning to South Dakota. This trip is an incredible blessing to the families in Juarez. The team prays the Holy Spirit works in those who

received God's Word.

The team's presence at the mission encourages Rev. Dr. Karl Heimer, YLM CEO, his son, Rev. Stephen Heimer, and all the caring and dedicated staff at the mission. But the week has a lifelong impact on the Faith team. The members are emotionally overwhelmed during the ceremony to present the new home to the family. The team finds great joy when distributing Bibles as the Mexican people received them with open arms. The group returns with new energy to be bold for the Lord after discovering that witnessing is a blessed way to partner with our great God and plant seeds for Him. 


