"I Pledge Allegiance"



This month we celebrate Flag Day. I want to take the opportunity to commemorate both flags on display in our sanctuary. We will discuss the Christian flag this month and the American flag next month (since we also have the 4th of July). By comparison, the Christian flag has fewer features. But like our American flag, this one is full of symbolism.

The flag has a red cross on a blue canton with a white field. The entire flag is reminiscent of Jesus.

The red cross gives us the most direct connection, helping us to remember that Jesus shed his blood for us on the cross of Calvary. His death (and resurrection) become ours in baptism. The cross is set into the blue canton in much the same way that we receive the benefits of the cross when we are baptized. The remainder of the flag is a white field, representing the perfection, purity, and sinlessness of Jesus. That sinless life becomes ours as well. Jesus gives us his perfection while taking our sin, putting it to death on the cross.

Flags and pledges go alongside one another. The Christian pledge has several different variations. The one I used growing up went like this: "I pledge allegiance to the Cross of our Lord Jesus Christ and to the Faith, for which it stands. One Savior, Eternal, with mercy and grace for all." Just like we pledge allegiance to our country (we will talk more about that next month), we also pledge our allegiance to our Lord. The two objects of our allegiance do not necessarily conflict with each other (although sometimes we are called to make a choice between something which is legal in our country but that God has spoken against and says is forbidden). Our allegiance to our Lord is a reality upon which no nation of the world can have any claim. Any and every Christian can speak with one voice that they love and follow Jesus. National boundaries do not prevent anyone from joining us in speaking this pledge, just as the kingdom of heaven will be filled with people from every different country.

As we worship and follow God, we do so at a certain geographical place. I am (as I suspect many of you are) a Christian American. We will not split hairs over that designation compared to American Christian (that is a "coffee-or-beer" conversation). God has called us to worship him while also being citizens of America. We have certain duties and privileges while also remembering with Saint Paul that "our citizenship is in heaven, and from it we await a Savior, the Lord Jesus Christ." Next month we will explore the ways in which our faith and our American citizenship work together, being people who are loved and redeemed by God who also witness and spread his love in the country where we live. **Pastor Sam**

THE PERFECT HOUSE

"The Lord said to her, "My dear Martha, you are worried and upset over all these details! There is only one thing worth being concerned about. Mary has discovered it, and it will not be taken away from her."

Luke 10:41-42 NLT

When I was growing up, many women, including my mother, were housewives. Before she was married, my mother worked in an insurance office, and then at the bank in my hometown. After my brother and I were born, Mom became a fulltime housewife and mother. From time to time, she filled in at the bank, and always worked at the Red Cross Bloodmobile; however, dedicating her life to taking care of the house and raising her children were her top priorities.

Mom and Dad built a new house in 1954. It was a small, cozy frame house with a second story, an attic, and a single-car garage. Mom took great care to see that the house was always clean and tidy. The windows sparkled and it always passed the white glove test. However, her pride and joy were the hardwood floors throughout the house. The floors had been laid painstakingly by my dad's uncle, slat by slat by slat. Actually, those floors were the crown jewel of the house – and still are.

The folks entertained relatives for Sunday noon dinner somewhat frequently, and Mom would also host her cottage Bible study, plus neighborhood coffee parties. The week before these events, she put a lot of elbow grease into cleaning – especially, those hardwood floors. She scrubbed, waxed and polished those floors into a high-intensity gleam, and woe to my brother and I if a black mark or scratch appeared! We would never hear the end of it!

Hospitality was an important part of the biblical world, even as it is today. Jesus mentions it often, in such stories as that of the Good Samaritan and the wedding at Cana. We need to remember that in the above passage, Jesus isn't criticizing Martha for her work in making the disciples feel welcome. Instead, He's pointing out that she's being distracted at that moment from what's more vital – hearing His words and treasuring His presence. Continued on page 4

Recipients of a New Home



Elidia, Rosalba, and Mateo

Rosalba is a 25-year-old single mother of 6-yearold Mateo. Her 51-yearold aunt, Elidia, has been her source of support for several years. While Rosalba works, Elidia takes care of Mateo, making sure he gets to and from school safely.

A few months ago, Rosalba, Mateo, and Elidia experienced a difficult and painful situation -due to jealousy over Elidia's care

of Rosalba and her son, Elidia's daughter demanded her mother, cousin and nephew leave her house. Rosalba had been saving up money and slowly paying off a little piece of land, but they had nowhere safe to go. The small family of three lived in Rosalba's van for several days, withstanding cold and frightening nights. Mateo had to be withdrawn from school as Rosalba worked to save up as much as she could to finish paying off her small piece of land.

Rosalba has been a member of Iglesia Luterana La Santa Biblia for 18 months now, helping organize and implement events along with other women of the congregation. It was through a conversation with Rosy Lira, deaconess at La Santa Biblia, Rosalba's painful struggles were shared.

Due to needs for repairs, the dorms of Iglesia Luterana San Lucas were closed after the last Haitian refugees got processed to enter the US. For Rosy, it was the place where Rosalba, her son, and Elidia could stay while Rosy reached out to the Servant Event ministry of Ysleta Lutheran Mission to help provide a little house for this small family of three.

A Letter from Rosalba



Salutations to all who will be helping me and my family!

Through this letter, we want to greatly thank you for your support during our situation. We are a family of three. My aunt, Elidia, is 51 years old and I have a son of 6 years. I am 25, a single mother. My name is Rosalba Kristell. Our life has been difficult and now, even more so, we need a house to call a home of our own. Unfortunately, my parents have not been in my

life, and I sought support and refuge with my aunt Elidia. She supported me, caring for my son while I worked. She opened the door of where she was living to us, but her daughter became jealous of my aunt caring for my son and evicted her, and us.

We stayed several days in my van. They were difficult days because it was during winter. My son had to withdraw from school as I kept working.

We shared our situation with Rosy Lira, the deaconess of our church. The congregation of San Lucas, where another deaconess, Yessika Lira, serves opened their refugee rooms for us to stay in. We are so thankful for the blessing of a roof over our heads.

We are thankful, from the bottom of our hearts, for the wonderful people you are and for all

your support.

May God always bless each of you.
