New Year, New You

I suppose you could expect an article about New Year's resolutions. If you have guessed what I am writing about, then you likely have given the idea of resolutions some thought. While I do encourage you to assess this past year and consider some ways in which you may want to change, this article will talk about the goal instead of the process. Change is, by nature, a putting off of one thing and a putting on of another. The individual who tries to increase their athleticism will likely run or shoot free throws or lift weights. The goal is, for example, to build up their body for the health benefits derived from a better-functioning self, or for the enjoyment and continued participation of some certain sport.

While I think athleticism important, I have much less to say about it than I do about your spirituality. I want you to identify some ways in which you could make changes to your spiritual practices. I will leave the particulars to you (although I might have some suggestions if you speak to me privately). Instead, I want to point you in the direction of the goal. Why should we seek changes and improvements in our spiritual practices? The words of St. Paul are helpful when he says, "We are to grow up in every way into him who is the head, into Christ" (Eph 4:15). Our lives are a continual growing up into Christ.

If you would read the whole of Ephesians chapter 4 (which would take you some 5-10 minutes depending on your reading speed), you would get a more complete picture of the type of change that St. Paul, and God, is advocating. We are to become more and more like Christ. Our process of change involves putting off the sinful, flesh-y activities and instilling in us the godly, spiritual activities. St. Paul gives some specific examples in the later part of the chapter. They are well worth considering. If we see ourselves rightly, clearly, then we each have some work to do in all of the ways he lists.

The process is similar to a child imitating an adult (in fact St. Paul will use language like this). Children play house because they see their parents managing the affairs of the house. They might not understand balancing checkbooks or multiplying recipes or creating schedules. This will come in time. We, as God's children, imitate Christ. We act like Christ. We might not know why at the beginning. We pray because we see Christ praying. We suffer because we see Christ suffering. Our goal is to participate more in those activities which Christ does and less in those which he rejects.

With the goal of imitating or copying Christ, what changes would you like to make? What bad habits can you give extra attention to breaking? What good habits can you plan to begin or to strengthen? The act of assessing your self and planning for change is a continual part of our lives as Christians. While you may not have the best track record with New Year's resolutions in general (I fall into that camp), this is one area where God promises his support and guidance. May this year be another in which we dedicate ourselves to being more fully God's beloved and redeemed people.

FOLLOWING THE STAR

Now after Jesus was born in Bethlehem of Judea in the days of Herod the king, behold wise men from the east came to Jerusalem, saying, "Where is he who has been born king of the Jews? For we saw his star when it rose and have come to worship him." Matthew 2:1&2

Twelve days after Christmas, January 6th, the Christian church will celebrate the feast of Epiphany. It is a season of light which emphasizes that God has revealed himself to us through the God-man Christ Jesus; recognized has both True God and True Man. Epiphany focuses on how God imparts his love, light and hope through Jesus.

The other day I was flipping through one of my favorite books of poetry by Susan Palo Cherwien and came across the following:

> We follow the star from Christmas into Epiphany. From the season of birth into the season of making known, we follow the star, the light, the Sun. But we should be cautioned: to follow the star is to follow it to Herod the child-killer to Bethlehem the stable to Egypt the exile to Jordan the drenching to Wilderness the void to Jerusalem the death. The glorious Sun guides us, the morning star leads us, but more likely to treachery than homage more likely to humility than embrace more likely to drowning than anointing more likely to emptiness than satisfaction more likely to dying than glory.

The morning star follows Jesus -- being chased and pursued by a paranoid potentate, and who starts life as a political refugee. He is baptized in the Jordan and experiences the emptiness of the wilderness. He is rejected by his own. Ultimately, he is the long-awaited one who has come to die for the sins of the world and be raised again in glory. Continued on page 4

Growing up, I don't recall a whole lot about Epiphany, other than I knew it followed Christmas and we sang some related hymns. Maybe everyone was too worn out from all the Christmas services and celebrations to give much thought to following the star. My deceased husband's parish made a fairly big deal over Epiphanytide -- lots of singing, serving Epiphany cake and chalking their doors. On the top of the door frame, one might see: 20C+M+B25 -- the CMB represented the three wisemen (traditionally named Caspar, Melchior and Balthazar), flanked by the year -- in this case, 2025. It was all kind of fascinating to me.

The three major events in the season of Epiphany are 1) the arrival of the Magi, 2) the baptism of Jesus, and 3) the Transfiguration, where we glimpse our Lord in divine splendor.

Here is my favorite Epiphany hymn, one that I remember singing back at Immanuel, my home church:

Brightest and best of the sons of the morning, Dawn on our darkness and lend us thine aid; Star of the East, the horizon adorning, Guide where our infant Redeemer is laid.

Are you ready to shine your light in dark places and celebrate the good news of God's saving grace?



As sinful people, we are incapable of giving God what He deserves from us. However, we can be confident that our gifts are acceptable to God through Jesus. To illustrate this point, a story is told about a wood -carver who early in his life was a renowned carver. He passed on his craft to his son. Later in his life, the old man's eyes began to dim, and his hands began to tremble. He could no longer carve

Endowment Fund

It has been requested that we give an explanation of the Endowment Fund and the options within that fund.

The Endowment Fund is truly about leaving a legacy. A donation to any part of the endowment would insure that you could support the ministry of this church well after you have passed on or left the church. The different accounts within the endowment were created to help a giver to have the opportunity to be specific about the areas where their investment is directed. Additionally, the giver is not limited to these specific accounts. Other fund accounts may be added (example: Scholarships for the daycare or preschool). The Board of Endowment wants this to be flexible and accommodating to the givers desires for their donation.

Blessings in Faith is the **original Fund** and is where any **undesignated** gifts to the Endowment fund go. The earnings are disbursed as follows: the first 15% to Missions (District/Synod), the second 15% to Seminary student aid, the rest goes to numerous projects within the congregation as requests are received and the Board designates.

Generations in Faith gifts go into the **Endowment General Fund**. The earnings here are used for general operations of the church. Just as if you were designating your offering for the general fund.


Foundations in Faith gifts go toward the **Endowment Building Fund**. Earnings from this fund go for building and maintenance projects.



Future in Faith gifts go toward **Education**. Earnings here are used for the support of Christian education within the church.
