As Winter Comes

I am not wishing for winter. We reflect this month on verse four of the hymn "O Blessed Spring" (LSB # 595). I encourage you to read or sing the entire hymn for yourself. Each verse sees the stages of human life in terms of the seasons: springtime for birth, summer for youth and early adulthood, autumn as the middle years, and winter as the close of our earthly life. Our task this month is twofold: to see our own lives in terms of these verses and to reflect upon those whose winters have come to an end. Here is verse four:

As winter comes, as winters must,
We breathe our last, return to dust;
Still held in Christ, our souls take wing
And trust the promise of the spring.

The song begins and ends with the remembrance of the spring (verse five does its own thing). While the song has been understanding our lives in terms of the seasons, the word "spring" holds a double meaning. At first, we may only see birth and infancy. But the song is included in the hymnal section "Baptismal Life." The spring is also our baptism, where our life in faith begins. Understood this way, the song presents its fuller double meaning.

"The promise of the spring" is not just the annual experience that after winter passes, spring arrives with the new growth of all green things. The promise of the spring is a reminder of our coming resurrection. The spring, meaning both our baptism and our eternal life, gives us hope. Even for Christians who have escaped the winter, who have died, we trust in their eventual new growth when Christ calls them from the grave.

We will again remember those in Christ who have died within the past year. "The Book of the Names of the Dead" will be on the Living Room table during the month of October. I encourage you to write the names of those who have fallen asleep in Jesus. As you write their names, remember that spring is coming. Christ, our true spring, is alive in our hearts and gives the promise of eternal life to all who trust in him. We will publicly remember and honor those from our church who have died within the past year during our All Saint's Day celebration on Sunday, Nov 2. Whatever season of life you may currently be in, Christ promises that spring is coming.





Forever Young is a group of 55 and older, retired or semi-retired folks who get together the third Thursday of each month for fellowship and great food. Please join us!




Men's Fellowship




