

She was an amazing and beautiful gift from God. Anyone looking at her would notice that Eve was unique and different from her husband, Adam. Yet the two complimented and fit each other perfectly, just as God intended. And through this union, God would bring blessings upon blessings to our world!

That was God's intent when He created them male and female—that He might bring blessings to the world. And that's what God desires of our marriages—husband and wife each complementing the other with the unique gifts He gives even as they bring blessings into this world.

It's interesting how far our world has strayed from what God had intended. Recently, I had the privilege of celebrating the consecration of two bishops in the Evangelical Lutheran Church of Latvia. It was quite a celebration with bishops from many of the surrounding Lutheran Churches in attendance. One such bishop has been in the news recently. Perhaps you've heard of him. His name is Rev. Juhana Pohjola, the Bishop of the Evangelical Lutheran Mission Diocese of Finland (ELMDF). As an aside, our Lutheran Church—Missouri Synod is in fellowship with the ELMDF.

Bishop Pohjola and one of his members, Dr. Päivi Räsänen (who is also a member of the Finnish Parliament), were charged by Finland’s Prosecutor General in incitement against a group of people for writing and publishing a booklet espousing the biblical view of marriage.

“As a Christian, I do not want to and cannot discriminate against or despise anyone created by God,” said Rev. Dr. Pohjola. “Every human being, created by God and redeemed by Christ, is equally precious.”

In the beginning, Adam and Eve had a perfect marriage. Unfortunately, all of that was lost after they fell into sin. As a result of sin, their familial relationship and their relationship with God was undeniably damaged. And

without intervention, all would have been lost forever.

And that’s why Jesus Christ came. He came to bridge the divide and repair the damage sin caused. When He suffered and died on the cross, He satisfied God’s anger toward our sins. And when He rose to life again on the third day, He brought hope and health to our wearied lives. Even more, He promises to live with us and make our relationships more fulfilling. Finally, when He returns, He will make His world—and each of us—perfect forever. While, in that day, there will be no marriage as we have come to know it, we will once again enjoy a perfect and lasting relationship with each other. Just as God had intended from the beginning.

Thanks be to God, on March 30, 2022, the Helsinki District Court in Finland issued a decision acquitting both Bishop Pohjola and Dr. Päivi Räsänen of their charges. While this decision brings some resolution to the matter, it is not over as the opposition has vowed to appeal.

In the meantime, the church continues to pray for both Bishop Pohjola and Dr. Räsänen that God’s Word would continue to be proclaimed to all, even to those in power as the Psalmist writes, “I will also speak of your testimonies before kings and shall not be put to shame” (Ps 119:46 ESV). As Bishop Pohjola expressed to me in our conversations, he is encouraged and uplifted by all the prayers and words of support he has received from so many within the church.
